SUBMARINE WAR TO GO MERRILY ON.

LONDON, July 23.—The Hague correspondent of The Evening News says:

"The Taeglich Runsbau publishes a violent tirade of Admiral Kirchhoff, denouncing the English official verdict on the Lusitania case, and declaring that submarine attacks on unarmed merchantmen will be continued regardless of the fate of neutrals. 'Admiral Kirchhoff says: 'Members of the German Government and the Admiralty of the crews of the submarines will sleep peacefully in the face of such accusations. They will continue just as before to commit such acts, no matter how loudly the proud and sanctimonious Britons may shriek about murder. The watchword for us is: Down with the ships that cross the bows of our valiant "U" boats, and with those carrying munitions under the protection of humanity. Our note has clearly declared that the presence of American passengers on board will make no difference in this respect. WASHINGTON IS "WAITING."

WASHINGTON, July 23.—With the delivery today by Ambassador Gerard to the Foreign Office in Berlin of the new American note, warning Germany that the loss of American lives through violations of neutral rights would be regarded as "unfriendly" by the United States rests its case for the present at least. The note will be given out here late today for publication tomorrow morning.

Officials of the Washington Government turned expectantly toward Berlin for some indication from official quarters there as to the reception of the communication. Until such information is at hand the next diplomatic move of the United States will not be decided upon.

The note is declared to be the final word of the United States Government with regard to further transgressions of its rights.

INCREASING THE MUNITION SUPPLY

LONDON, July 27.—There has been a clean sweep from the Russian War Office of the men responsible for the shortage of ammunition, according to the correspondent at Petrograd of the Daily Mail.

The correspondent reports the existence in the Russian capital of a more cheerful feeling at the courageous resistance which the Russian armies are making to the Austro-German advance. He adds that the frank admission by the authorities is now making for the first time publicly that no large Russian counter-offensive is possible until the mobilisation of industry bears fruit in a largely increased supply of munitions.

Now that the War Minister, the assistant minister and others responsible for the shortage have been dismissed," the correspondent adds, "the nation feels confident that the terrible miscalculations will not be repeated and that the country is putting its whole energy into the task of repairing them."

General Soukhomlinoff, the Russian Minister of War, resigned on June 26 and Emperor Nicholas designated General Polivanoff to fill the office. The reason for the resignation of General Soukhomlinoff was not stated.

POSTPONEMENT OF BECKER'S EXECUTION.

NEW YORK, July 27.—Supreme Court Justice Ford awaited today the filing of briefs by counsel for Charles Becker and by representatives of the District Attorney in Becker's application for a third trial on the ground of newly discovered evidence. Counsel was prepared to file the briefs this afternoon.

In order to obtain time for the consideration of the documents Justice Ford had requested the Warden of Sing Sing Prison and had granted a two days' postponement of the date set for Becker's execution. Becker was to have gone to the electric chair early Wednesday morning, but the warden ordered the execution postponed until Friday.

Justice Ford was impelled to ask for this delay owing to the shortness of time in which to pass upon the application for a new trial. He said that he would endeavour to decide on the motion as soon as possible. It is stated that no witnesses for either side will be heard. Becker at Sing Sing received notice of his two days' respite calmly.

W. M. S. CONVENTION

The District Convention of the W. M. S., met in Grace Methodist Church on July 22nd. The morning session was taken up in hearing reports which were all very encouraging.

The afternoon session was opened with devotional exercises, led by Mr. Albert Mutch, President of Mt. Herbert Auxiliary. Mrs. William Long, President of Grace Church Aux., in a few well chosen words welcomed the delegates to the church and connected with this chart talk. Mrs. Wright, a lady from Baltimore was brought to the platform by Mrs. Full, and proved a very pleasing speaker, adding much to the interest of the afternoon session. This paper was closed with a half-hour consecration service. Both sessions were presided over by Miss White, the newly appointed district organizer. Miss Olive Ritchie had charge of the music for both sessions which added much to the pleasure of the Convention and credit to herself.

Dr. Ayer presided at the evening session. After singing and prayer led by Rev. Dr. Fulton, Mrs. A. M. Johnson sang a solo which touched all hearts. Rev. Mr. Littlejohn gave one of his illimitable violin solos. Mrs. Sanford's address was full of instruction, she led the convention from one mission field to another and awakened a more earnest desire for greater effort in future.

A few earnest remarks by the chairman brought a good convention to a close.

GREAT PATRIOTIC SERVICE IN LONDON

LONDON, July 26.—The Rt. Rev. Arthur W. Ingram, Bishop of London, last evening conducted a huge open air intercession service on the steps of St. Paul's Cathedral for the armies of Great Britain and her allies to which 3,500 territorialists marched in a body. Twenty thousand persons were present. In his address the Bishop said in part:—

"The soul of Britain will free the world again. No calamity could be more awful to contemplate than at this supreme crisis in the history of the world, if Britain should fall. The call which was addressed to the nation for military service, is the greatest call that could be addressed to any nation. We are fighting for the freedom of the home, the liberties of the world and international honor. Christ, upon the cross, was opposed to the revival of the pagan doctrine that 'might is right.' The church calls upon the nation to say that no sacrifice matters if we win."

CONSPIRATORS PUBLICLY HANGED.

SOFIA, Bulgaria, July 26.—The three ring leaders of the conspiracy, which resulted in the bomb outrage at the Casino here on February 14 last, were publicly hanged yesterday. A bomb was thrown into the Sofia Casino in February while a gala performance was in progress. Ten persons were wounded, including a daughter of the minister of war. A son of General Vojteff was killed and several of the wounded died later.

methods for reducing the present great discrepancy between the price received by the producer and that paid by the consumer.

THE NEED OF SPECIAL METHODS

It is pointed out that the great area of agricultural land in the Dominion emphasizes the need of special methods of production to meet local conditions, and creates unusual problems relating to distribution of products in home markets, to the trade thus created, the transport of products to Canadian ports and their carriage to foreign markets. All these questions are inter-related. They grow out of and reach back to the main outstanding question of increased production.

There are in addition some more or less independent problems, arising out of the war. An official memorandum on the subject states that representations have been made to the Government that large numbers of persons, who, before emigrating to Canada, had been engaged in agricultural pursuits, have not settled upon the land in Canada, but have been attracted by the opportunities for obtaining high wages in the cities and towns and in the construction of railways and other works.

The Question of Unemployment.

The opportunities for thus obtaining work have recently become considerably restricted, and this result has brought about a greater degree of unemployment than usually prevails. It further appears that very large areas of land for which homesteaders have secured patents are not under cultivation, and it is considered that the causes which have led to these results are a proper subject for thorough enquiry. In connection with the above subjects, the memorandum further states, consideration should be given to the conditions which will arise upon the conclusion of the present war, and to the resulting opportunities for a vigorous and effective policy of immigration which should have as its object the purpose of attracting to our shores immigration of a suitable type, and of inducing the settlement of an agricultural population upon the fertile uncultivated lands which are abundant in both western and eastern Canada. In this connection, inquiry should be made as to the means by which, and the lines upon which, the Federal Government, whether upon its own sole initiative or in co-operation with provincial governments, can best carry out an effective scheme of colonization.

Return of Our Heroes.

The return to Canada, after the conclusion of the war, of the Canadian troops now gallantly fighting beyond the seas for our Empire, and the probable immigration into Canada of other British soldiers and of men from the allied armies, after peace shall have been established, should also engage the attention of the Commission, in order that every possible opportunity, through the assistance and co-operation of the Federal and Provincial Governments may be afforded to those who may seek employment.

The Prime Minister in a memorandum upon this subject further observes that for reasons above indicated, the question of transportation, whether by land or water carriage, is closely connected with the problems under consideration. With this should be considered the advantages which would undoubtedly be derived from permanent improvement of highways which are in truth the important part of our transportation system.

The Railway Situation.

The approaching completion of two additional transcontinental railways is a very important element in our transportation problem. It has been represented to the Government that their construction has considerably anticipated the capacity of the Dominion to provide traffic for trunk lines; while on the other hand, important portions of newly settled territory are without the facilities which would be afforded by branch lines incident to a more carefully considered system of railway development. The conditions thus created invites the careful attention of the Commission.

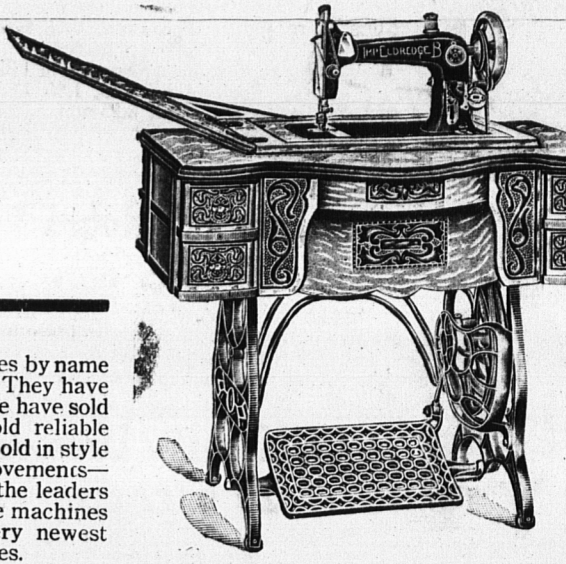
