

Saints Chalk Up 7-3 Victory Over Strong U.N.B. Squad

A.J. McAdam's S.D.U. football team Saturday wound up their season's intercollegiate football schedule when they came from behind in the second half to defeat U.N.B. 7-3 in a hard-fought, closely played tussle.

Giving up a try in the closing minutes of the first session when Kehler of the visitors gathered in a blocked kick on the 25-yard line to race over the last stripe for a try, after Saints had enjoyed a wide edge in territory, the local university fifteen pushed back on the defensive for the first minutes of the second session broke into the scoring column 11 minutes after the start. A kick took the oval from middle to the U.N.B. 15-yard line and as Joe Mahar went to gather in it, he was tackled. It was a penalty kick for the Saints and McAdam split the uprights with a placement from directly in front of the posts and 20 yards out.

That made the score 3-2 and U.N.B. kept play inside the Saints territory as their scrum continued to control the ball. Then like a bolt out of the blue came the winning score. Backed on their own fifteen yard line, Saints got away a dribble that earned right to the visitors' ten-yard mark and as the visiting fullback's attempt to punt out of danger was partially blocked, Des Burge, big S.D.U. forward gathered the skin in to plunge head over heels just this side of the upright. Again McAdam's toe came into the picture and he booted the extra points to give his team a 5-2 lead.

The margin was sufficient, U.N.B. fighting back harder than ever, carried play back up the field only to have Saints kick or run the ball out of danger. With three minutes to go the visitors began within 15 yards of a try for times the Saints' line held and finally Blanchard booted the ball out to the thirty. Again Des Burge came back and again Saints held, the final whistle going after the U.N.B. gam had come up with a bit of outstanding passing as they sought to work a man into the clear.

Sharp tackling was evidenced all during the game. Injuries were frequent but not of a serious nature as the two clean-playing squads played hard driving football all the way with the visitors impressing with the manner in which they worked the two man scrums.

The big crowd of fans got their first thrill in the first five minutes when McAdam nearly broke into the clear on a 20 yard dash down the sideline, but in the next fifteen minutes play waged mostly around the centre field strips as both teams played it close to the chest, giving opposing backfields rare a chance to get started.

In the closing half of the session, Saints trying desperately to break the stalemate hemmed the visitors inside their own 25-yard line; at one time they plunged right to the 2-yard line only to have U.N.B. push and claw their way out of danger. Getting the U.N.B. out of an exchange of punts, Des Burge later took to midfield and seconds later John King, fast wing three quarters raced to the Saints 20-yard line on a brilliant run. It was the break that led to the U.N.B. score. Getting the ball from the scrum, Saints attempted to punt over the heads of the incoming tacklers but Kehler gathered the low kick in to his midriff and raced over for a try just as the S.D.U. fullback took him down with a diving tackle.

Canadiens Win From Chicago Black Hawks 4-2

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—The hapless Chicago Black Hawks suffered their sixth consecutive National Hockey League defeat tonight as Montreal Canadiens took a 4-2 victory before 16,761 fans.

In the last minute of play, a free-for-all broke out, the result of earlier, intensely furious play. Out of it Butch Bouchard drew a match penalty for punching referee George Hayes while major penalties went to Ralph Mattress and Bob Carse for fighting and to Emile Francis and Jimmy Peters of a private mix-up of their own.

Canadiens swept into a 4-0 lead at the end of the two periods, sweeping to three of the goals in the second. Of the last two deciding goals, the first by Elmer Lach, came when the Hawks were short-handed and the second occurred as Maurice Richard, taking the puck out of a mass of players around the Canadiens goal, soled down the ice and beat Emile Francis. Bob Carse scored the first period goal at 11:57 and Lach made it 2-0 at 6:35 of the second. Francis Thomas scored his first big league goal at 3:15 and Hank Bladed counted again at 10:05.

Red Wings Tied With Boston For League Lead

DETROIT, Nov. 2 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings knocked Boston Bruins out of their undisputed National Hockey League lead tonight by trading a crowd of 13,375 fans to a 2-1 victory over the pace-setters.

Detroit's fourth win in seven games hoisted the Red Wings into first place with Bruins, who absorbed their first defeat since the season here after playing a 1-1 tie with Toronto last night.

Rookie centre Max McNab tipped the puck into the net when the Red Wings 1-0 lead early in the second period and Armand (Bep) Guidolin, who came to Detroit this season in a swap for Billy Taylor in Jerry Couture's long shot to give the Bruins a 1-0 lead early in the first period.

The Detroit net was punched a four-foot shot past Harry Lumley, the Detroit goalie.

That spotted what might have been Lumley's second shutout of the season. Only 21 Boston shots got to him and one of them sent him, Frankie Brimsek turned back 37 Red Wing shots.

The game was noticeably short on penalties with only four being called by referee Bill Chadwick.

When Guidolin began in the winning goal a substitute was on the ice for defenceman Pat Egan of the Bruins, who had objected so loudly to Chadwick's work that he some of the more promising rookies rather than send them to Buffalo, because events have proven that he needs them.

Canadiens didn't get the run on Leafs at any time in their last Wednesday game, but, on the other hand, they might have broken loose for a bundle had they had any of the breaks. They didn't get one all night in spite of hard trying. The Toronto checking game held them down, but in their next meeting, which will be in Montreal, Canucks will, as usual, try to shake loose for that goal.

Had they been able to score the first goal they might have prevailed. In any event the fine showing of Richard, who sometimes finds it hard to reveal his best form in Toronto, was a gratifying feature. The way the Rockies are going he looks like a forty goal man at least, unless he is injured.

M.A.A.U. Meets At Moncton

LT-CL. W. W. Reid, D. S. O. E.D., was re-elected president of the Maritime Amateur Athletic Union at the annual meeting held Saturday at Moncton. Other officers elected included three vice-presidents representing each of the provinces. They were Dr. W. C. Ross, Halifax, S. F. Doyle, Charlottetown, and Harold Chowan, Saint John. Mr. A. W. Rogers, Charlottetown, is the secretary-treasurer.

Island delegates to the meeting included W. W. Reid, S. F. Doyle, A. W. Rogers, Charlottetown, E. O'Farrell and J. C. Hogan, Summerside, and Major Rogers, reporting on the activities of the Union since it was organized in April this year, said that eleven clubs are now affiliated with the organization. A total of 263 amateur cards were issued.

Highlights of the seven months since the Union came into being, were the track and field meet at Halifax and the boxing tournament at Moncton.

The meeting made plans for further promotional work, to track and field and boxing and decided to hold a combined track and field meet in Moncton.

The president said the M. A. A. U. was well-organized and functioning well. In baseball, however, there was no inter-provincial set-up. Consequently the M. A. A. U. stepped into the picture to arrange playdowns.

Justice Elliot Hudson of Halifax moved that the union call a meeting of the president and secretaries of the three baseball organizations of the Maritimes, not later than May 1, 1948, to form a Maritime Baseball organization. Failing this the M. A. A. U. would arrange Maritime playdowns. The motion carried unanimously.
