CABLE TO SITKA BROKEN BY SHOCK

SEATTLE, Jan. 20.—Great apprehension is felt here today regarding what probable action may have resulted from the earthquake in Alaska which was felt in this section late yesterday afternoon. The United States cable between Seattle and Sitka went out of commission shortly after two o'clock yesterday afternoon, an hour and a half before the quake was felt on Puget Sound. It is believed that marine disturbances, a forerunner of the shocks, put the cable to the bad by swinging it against the sharp edges of rocks on which it rests in the straits of San Juan De Fuca near Cape Flattery, where the break is said to have occurred.

According to the seismograph record at the State University, the centre of the shock must have been in South-eastern Alaska. Juneau, Ketchikan, Skagway, Cordova, Valdez, and Steward, are important towns where great damage could have occurred. At Juneau the largest mines in the world, the Treadwell group, are located, and if the shock caused slides or cave-ins, scores of men would have been killed. Many of the places are situated but a few feet above the sea level and a tidal wave would have swept them out of existence. Many Alaskans believe that Mount St. Helens has broken forth, or some of the smaller supposed extinct volcanoes along the Aleutian chain have suddenly become active.

Y. M. C. A. NOTES.

The work in North America has made more progress last year than in any previous year. Eighty four new buildings costing over \$10,000,000 were opened, and as many more are under construction or provided for, to cost \$8,000,000. The membership of the 1,924 branches has increased to 446,000.

In the physical department alone 130,000 men and boys are increasing their Physical Status in 813 gymnasiums, taught by 413 trained physical directors, assisted by 6,400 volunteer leaders.

The thousands of Bible classes, conducted have an enrolment of 105,000 men and boys, while 100,000 each week attend religious services.

The local Association here in Charlottetown has an enrolment of 200 young men and boys under 20 years of age and about 65 of these attend Bible classes some evening each week.—Com.

INTERESTING EXPERIENCE OF LEADING DIVINE

(Written for the Saturday Guardian). Venturing to hope the following account of the Mission held in the autumn, at the church in Halifax of which the Archdeacon Armitage is rector will be both interesting and profitable, a lady in this city writes: The mission held in St. Paul's church was largely attended, it was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Kennedy who Dr. Armitage met at the Pan-Anglican Congress in London, he is a rector of a church in Bournemouth, England, a most gifted man, very handsome and cultured and a splendid elocutionist, with a great command of language. The church was crowded even the aisles were filled with benches and chairs. There were three or four services each day and always a meeting for business men at twelve o'clock, which was always crowded. One incident Mr. Kennedy related made a great impression on those who heard him. He said he had all his life belonged to a fashionable set of people—and always had plenty of money—but he said his friends never troubled themselves about religion until one day he and a friend of his were invited out to dinner. He said they were nice people to whose house they were invited, but not a bit their sort, they called them the "goody goody" set. However they could not very well get out of going. The dinner passed off all right. They found they were the guests of cultured people, and there was no reference made to religion. Their host accompanied them to the gate and when he shook hands with them he gave each a little tract. After they were on their way home, he and his friend said to each other "well we never heard of such a thing—for we both dated tracts and tract givers, in fact we were despised them." Mr. Kennedy said he went home but he could not get the tract out of his mind and felt curious to know what was in it. Three times he took it out of his pocket and put it back, then he thought he would have a smoke and after filling his pipe he made up his mind to see what it said. It was a simple little narrative headed "Now or Never," it was about a miner who had been persuaded to go to a Mission Hall, and an earnest Christian spoke to him and finally got him on his knees saying "Now or Never"—and there and then this poor miner took Christ as his personal Saviour. SURGICAL LAUNCH FOR DR. GRENFELL

PRINCETON, N. J., Jan. 20.—A plan was announced in Princeton today by which it is hoped that a memorial to Dr. Andrew J. McCosh, who died recently, may be established. The idea is to raise \$5,000 or more and buy a launch to be presented to Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell for the missionary work he is doing in Labrador. The boat will be fitted with surgical instruments and supplies. It is expected that the amount can be raised quickly by subscriptions from Princeton men who knew and loved Dr. McCosh. A Princeton volunteer crew may go to Labrador next summer to assist Dr. Grenfell.
