—KENSINGTON FACTORY.—Mr. H. Brown has taken over his new duties as cheese maker in the Kensington Factory. Owing to the lateness of the season this year, the work will probably be light for a while. Mr. Brown is an experienced man, having had in his charge last year the factory at Stanley Bridge. Mr. Leo Hughes, who ran the Kensington factory last season, has charge of the factory at Reside's Corner, this year. Mr. James McKinnon of Kensington, one of the boys who a few years ago started to work in the factory, as a boy will this year have full charge of the branch factory at Hamilton, P.E.I.—Y.

—EMERALD ROAD.—This is the season that roadmasters should pay some attention to the roads, and have drains filled up that were cut out by freshets and heavy rains. A few shovels full of earth on the approaches to bridges and small culverts would allow carriages and heavy loads to pass over much easier. Many cheese factories have begun the season's work, and heavy loads of milk drawn over rough places is hard on wagons and milk cans and cause considerable milk to be lost on the way to the factories. A few days' work of two or three men in each district would make a great improvement, and the work should not be postponed until half the summer is passed.
