### A SPLENDID DINNER FOR HEARTY EATERS

Short ribs of beef, brown gravy  
Plain boiled potato Bread  
Sweet dill pickles  
Apple pie Cheese  
Coffee

Put the ribs to boil in just enough water to cover them. Salt, add two pepper pods, one slice of onion and one laurel leaf. Boil slowly until tender. Take up, wipe dry, lay in a baking pan, sift little flour over them and brown in oven. There will be enough fat in the pan for the gravy. Heat it, stir in one heaping tablespoon of flour and stir well until lumps disappear. Turn into this flour and fat one and one-half cups of cold water and allow to boil five minutes. Place the ribs on a platter, peel the potatoes which have been boiled with their jackets on, place them around the ribs and send the gravy to the table in a gravy boat. This dinner will be eaten with a relish by every one in the family.

### Zealot Enrolment, No. 38, Dept. of Agriculture.

Zealot is a black Stallion six years old and weighs ten hundred and ten pounds. He is a fast natural pacer sired by Commodore Lydam, dam by Abdiellah Messenger dam of two in the 2.30 list, also grand dam of Orwell Bell 2.20 1-4, second dam by Don Joan, third dam by old Flying Frenchman. As his breeding will show Zealot is a race horse of first quality. After a heavy season in the stud he started eight times in 1912 and was always in the pay line. At Summit side on September 22nd he was second to Happy George in 2.23 on a slow track and a cold day with a strong wind blowing. At Charlottetown a week later he started in the 2.40 stake against Strong Field and finished third, came back the next day in the 2.17 class against a field of seasoned Campaigners and fought a four head battle but had to be content with fourth money. His Ice Campaign consisted of one start at Charlottetown, when he faced the imported mare Rexall Girl to her limit to beat him and then only could do it by a nose. Zealot has proved himself to be a steek getter among the best. One of his daughters at two years old sold last exhibition in Charlottetown for two hundred dollars and there are many more a good as she was. Zealot will make the season of 1913 at the owners' stable Vernon River Bridge where he will serve a limited number of choice mares at ten dollars for the season to be settled by cash or note at the time of first service.
