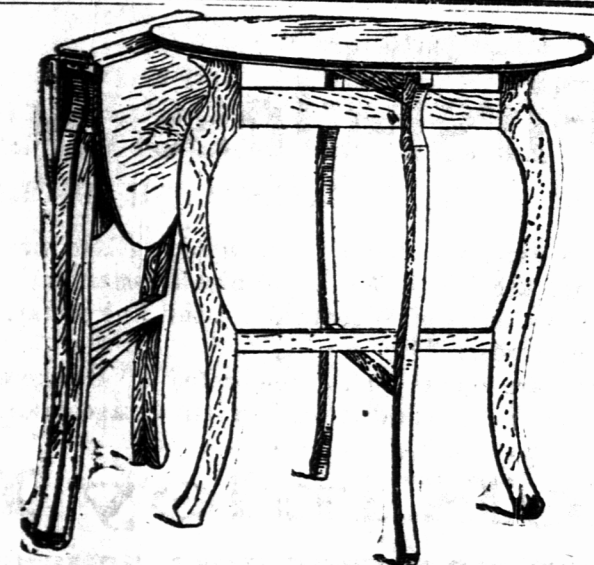

THAT WAREHOUSE.

In King's County, which is under the Scott Act, there are a number more or less notorious violators of the act whose offences have been taken notice of by the energetic prosecutor, Mr. Bears. Their names have been made familiar to GUARDIAN readers. Mr. Scrimgeour's name appeared frequently in the list of the convictions in former times as did those of Madame Dingwell, Madame Keogh, Madam Leadwell, Madam Martin, of Dundas, Madam McAulay, of Annandale, Sarah O'Connor, John J. Campbell, Wm. McNeill, Neil Campbell and wife, Joe McNeill and others.

There are divers reasons why it was and is inconvenient for those engaged in the illicit sale of stimulants to keep large quantities on hand, because the law gives power to its officers to break in, seize and confiscate such merchandise. It is equally inconvenient to send to Charlottetown frequently for small quantities. Hence it is easy to see how Mr. Scrimgeour and the distinguished company of law-breakers just enumerated should think it would be "in the public interest" to have a central place of supply where the stuff could be kept in stock and safe from seizure. This is, we believe, the true inwardness of the bonded warehouse in Mr. Scrimgeour's cellar.

For a fee of \$40 he secures the protection of the government look—with which the Scott Act constable cannot interfere. It is to the private interest of Mr. Scrimgeour to thus secure the strong protection of the government. His warehouse is a convenience to those whose business is a constant violation of the law, and to them and him only. And the Minister of Customs is made to believe that "the public interest will be subserved thereby!"

The matter of Manitoba school funds is again being discussed in a manner that suggests the possibility of its being again brought before parliament. In brief the situation is this: Certain lands were set apart in Manitoba as school lands, and the proceeds of their sale goes into a fund at Ottawa. The province to which the fund belongs, receives annually the interest on this fund, and devotes it to the support of schools. Last year the province applied for an advance of \$300,000 out of the \$475,000 of its fund at Ottawa. A bill was passed through the Commons to advance this sum out of the fund, but the Senate's action is two-fold. In the first place there is more than a willingness to reject one of the Laurier government's measures. And in the second place those who hope to see separate schools yet re-established in Manitoba are looking to the fund derived from school lands to help support the separate system.

We cordially endorse the Examiner's desire for more light "to illuminate the darkness of Mr. Scrimgeour's cellar." We too would like to see the correspondence by which it was made to appear that "the public interest would be subserved" by this warehouse. And there is an easy way to get it. We trust that some member of parliament will move for the correspondence.

They are making five hour speeches in the Commons these days notwithstanding the comment that Mr. Bells modest speech of one hour was pronounced too long. Sir Charles Tupper from being the leader of a great party, and possessing a vast store of public information, has some excuse for speaking at length. But for Mr. Davin of Assiniboia to speak for five hours, as he did the other day is rather too much. There ought to be a time limit in the Commons as there is in the Congress at Washington. A mediocrity who holds the floor for five hours at a time is a public nuisance that ought to be abated.

Says the Examiner: "The question is not, now, whether the Liberal Conservative party will take up the question of prohibition, so much as whether the prohibitionists of Canada, who have been tricked, will hit back at Sir Wilfrid and his treacherous government?" We have no doubt that if the Conservative leaders will undertake to give the country prohibition the prohibitionists will "hit back at Sir Wilfrid" with a will. But if both parties refuse to have anything to do with prohibition why shall the prohibitionists "hit" one any more than the other? It is utterly unreasonable for the Conservative leaders and their press to expect to obtain the prohibitionist vote in a body while they stand opposed to the law which the prohibitionists want.
