It is understood that H. M. S. Cornwall will leave on Monday for Quebec where a stay of five days will be made before returning to this port. The original plans, which included a trip to Bermuda, have been cancelled and after proceeding to Halifax from this port the Cornwall will sail for England. Yesterday afternoon officers and men from the vessel came ashore and indulged in a variety of sports and games at Victoria Park and another contingent was at the Golf Links. Yesterday morning Captain Palmer, Private Secretary to Governor Rogers, called on Captain Ley. The latter called on His Honor in the forenoon. At one o'clock His Honor entertained at luncheon at the Victoria Hotel, Captain Ley and other officers of the ship, Premier Hazard, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and several other prominent citizens. Among the callers at the ship were Premier Hazard, Hon. John Richards, Commissioner of Agriculture and Ex-Governor MacKinnon. A football match has been arranged for Saturday afternoon as announced in another column. On that afternoon a team of twelve from the ship will compete with a team from the Golf Club at Belvidere Links, luncheon being served at twelve by the Ladies of the Club.

Yesterday evening about ten minutes to seven a fire was discovered in a bedroom in the residence of Prof. C. M. Wright, 7 Brighton Road. The blaze was extinguished without calling in the firemen, but not before the curtains, a quantity of bedclothes and a mattress had been destroyed.

Three of the members of the crew of the schooner Elva M., which recently disabled at Summerside, called at the office yesterday and wished to correct an item which appeared in yesterday's issue and which said that after being disabled the crew of the schooner refused to proceed. That they claimed was wrong, and they state that the captain gave no orders, and without these, the crew could not proceed.

American immigration flowed mainly to Saskatchewan and Alberta, Ontario received 10,500 immigrants from the United States, and Quebec about the same number, nearly two thirds of British Columbia's immigration is from the United States.

Roosevelt and, according to word that has reached the Roosevelt special train, he is to attack Mr. Roosevelt for his attitude with respect to the tariff as expressed in the Saratoga platform.

HALIFAX, Oct. 19.—Rev D. Jacob Mountain, formerly of Toronto, and of late years resident in England, has recently passed away. He was the oldest graduate of King's College, Windsor, and remembered his alma mater in his will, having bequeathed the sum of \$5,000 to the alumni of the college, the interest of which is to be handed over to the governors yearly, to be at their disposal.

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT PORTUGAL.

Here are some interesting facts about Portugal, that passed from Monarchy to Republicism the other day:

Portugal has 40 banks, including savings banks.

King Manuel II. was born Nov. 15, 1889, and acceded to the throne Feb. 1, 1908.

Portugal's colonies had an area of 817,350 square miles, and a population of 9,266,008 in 1909.

Portuguese public schools numbered 339 in 1896, 10 years later they dropped to 4,248.

Portugal, including the Azores and Madeira, comprises an area of 35,948 square miles, and a population (in 1909) of 5,423,659.

The Portuguese are the longest headed people in Europe. In stature they are below the average. Blond hair practically absent. One-fifth of the population have black hair; the remainder are very dark.

The Portuguese Republican party came into existence in 1881, and has since carried on a more or less active propaganda, stimulated in 1889 by the success of the revolution in Brazil, which made that country a republic.

The story of Portugal is the oft repeated story of the rise and fall of great nations and despotic dynasties. Its history takes one back into prehistoric times, when a race made up of the native Iberian stock of the Peninsula, and the immigrant Celts, called the Celtiberian race, succeeded the peoples of the stone age. Even in this day relics are common in Portugal and there have been discovered seeming indications of human occupation in the earliest age.

Long before the birth of Christ the Greeks colonized Portugal and called the leading city Lisbon, the name being derived from the ancient Greek Olympe. In 148 B. C. the Romans conquered the country and were in turn ousted by the Mohammedans in the eighth century.

The Spanish king, Ferdinand, drove out the Moslem horde and annexed the country in 1064, re-organizing the land into feudal counties. In 1095 the count of Burgundy married to the illegitimate daughter of a Spanish king, was given the title of count of Portugal. From this union sprang the first Portuguese dynasty. Their son made the country independent of Spain and assumed the title of King in 1139, styling himself Alfonso I. His son succeeded father in turn until the last of the line, Henry, died in 1580. Portugal during those years reached the highest rank of the world's nations, as the greatest of maritime powers. Lisbon was one of the greatest commercial cities of Europe and the seat of one of the world's most famous universities. Great domains in South America, including Brazil, millions of square miles in Asia and Africa were discovered and annexed.

But the decline had already begun; the highest crest of Portuguese greatness had been crossed, and Portugal

UNDER SPANISH RULE.

For a few years the throne was vacant and the land again passed under the rule of Spain. In 1640 a successful conspiracy threw off the Spanish yoke and placed upon the throne John, Lube of Braganza, the illegitimate son of a former Portuguese dynasty trace their reign back through illicit channels.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE STUDY OF CANCER.

PARIS, Oct. 18.—The second triennial international conference on the study of cancer has just concluded its five days' meeting. Two hundred and fifty delegates represented twenty-two countries. W. B. Foley, chairman of the Huntington fund for cancer research; James Ewing of Cornell University, Harvey Gaylord of the New York State laboratory and S. P. Beebe of Cornell were America's representatives.

Dr Gaylor read a paper on "Passive Immunity in Cancer," describing studies of cancers in fish. Dr Beebe read a paper on the chemistry of cancer. The chief question discussed was whether cancer is parasitic or non-parasitic. The burden of proof seemed to lie on the upholders of the parasitic theory, as a majority of the delegates do not believe in a specific parasite.

New methods of treatment were exhaustively discussed. Surgery was unanimously approved if it were possible to totally remove the growth. It was generally agreed that radium, X-rays and high frequency currents were of some value in cases of inoperable tumors, especially superficial ones, but all three were considered only as palliative treatment, needing combination with biological treatment by serum vaccination.

Every one seemed confident that a few years' more study along the latter lines would yield solid results. Three cases of cures by vaccination in Paris were described. The treatment is not painful and is founded on a scientific basis.

AN ELECTION IS EXPECTED IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—The abrupt transition from pessimism to optimism respecting the peto conference is not justified by definite information. While the cabinet has had a prolonged session, it has not considered any form of compromise, but has tried to pull itself together respecting the Osborne judgment and the expediency of the introduction of a short bill for the payment of members. This is the opinion of practical politicians on the radical side, who assert that the by-election at Walthamstow makes it necessary for the government to adopt a definite policy respecting the grievances of trade unionism. The cabinet is not united on that question, and a series of meetings will be requisite before an agreement can be reached.

The most plausible explanation of what is going on at the conference is that each side is manoeuvring for position in the next general election, that the issues discussed there will be transferred to the national canvass, and that each party will be judged by the extent and nature of its demands and concessions.

Two questions remaining are, first, a method of dealing with a deadlock between the houses either on the lines of the veto resolution of the upper chamber, either by modification of Lord Roseberry's plan or by the adoption of a devolution scheme for Ireland, Scotland and Wales; or by David Lloyd-George's proposals for linking the colonies to the mother country in an imperial council.

A ROPE OF BEDCLOTHES.

GALT, Ont., Oct. 16.—With a rope formed of his bedclothes, John Egerton Thursday morning lowered himself from the second storey window of his burning home. A lamp exploded in his cellar and he thought he had extinguished the blaze, but woke to find the house in flames. His wife and two daughters were away and he was alone in the house. Within fifteen minutes of his escape his house was destroyed.
