Supreme Court.

SATURDAY, JUNE 30. Geo. Farrah vs. Robert Van Iderstine; action for false arrest. An interlocutory having been obtained, a rule nisi was granted to chambers to show cause why the damages in this case should not be assessed by a jury before a Judge of the Supreme Court.

L. E. Prowse and another vs. Chas. J. Patton, an absent or absconding debtor. The rule to show cause why the absent debtor attachment and proceedings thereon should not be set aside was commenced this morning but not concluded.

Tuesday, July 3th.—The petit jury appeared this morning for the purpose of sitting on the cases to be tried before a jury. The criminal cases were first taken up.

The Queen vs. James McAleer, indictment for stealing some rubber mats. The prisoner, although a mere lad not in his teens, has been before the Police Court, and this Court many times but has heretofore escaped on account of his tender years.

The next case called was an indictment against William Welsh, known amongst his pale as "Smiler." In this prosecution he is charged with entering a house with intent to commit an assault on Harriet Farquharson.

Wednesday, July 4th. The Queen vs. William Welsh. Burglary with intent to commit indecent assault on Harriet Farquharson. Verdict of jury—not guilty.

The Queen vs. Wm. Welsh. Burglary and attempt to commit indecent assault on Christy McDonald. Mr. Mellish, counsel for defence, moves that deposition before commissioner to take statement of a material witness be not received.

Court decides not to receive deposition as filed and orders a new commission to take same over again; also amends indictment. Attorney-General for Crown; J. T. Mellish for defendant.
