Lights flash in French homes to R. A. F. planes

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(CP)—Two-motored Bristol Beaufort bombers were greeted by lights flashed from French homes when they soared in from the sea to raid Nantes at the mouth of the Loire River Sunday night, the Air Ministry said tonight.

Some residents of the port, excited to note for the slaying of a German officer and another 50 face similar deaths unless the slayers are discovered, threw open their doors and lit up their houses "as though blackout curtains had been torn aside from the windows," the ministry said.

Announcement of the Nantes incident highlighted an otherwise routine account of continued daylight forays against northern France. Overnight activity was rechecked by bad weather to coastal command patrols of channel and North Sea waters. Lockheed Hudsons of the command attacked an Axis convoy off the Netherlands coast, but details of the action were not immediately available, the ministry said.

London rounded out its third month without an air raid warning. The city has had one alert in a short time since being hit in September, 1940.

Tonight German raiders were over southwest England and one western town. One German bomber was reported destroyed. Only a few bombs, in details of the harvest, were not immediately available, the ministry said.

Says Nazi talk Of fake map Most amusing

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today that Nazi protestations of "fake" at his statement that he had a German map for the partition of South American were most amusing.

It's a scream, he told his press conference, it's good.

Told that German sources had said a map purporting to show how Latin America would be divided by the Axis was a joke, Mr. Roosevelt said the charge was in the same class as that a week or 10 days ago that he was responsible for torpedoing the American destroyer Kearny.

The map, Mr. Roosevelt said, came from a source which was undoubtedly reliable. There is no question about that, he said.

But he declined to make public the map or a document he said described Nazi plans to suppress religions, both of which he mentioned in his navy day speech last night. It might choke off sources of information, he said, remarking that the map contained some notations which might permit tracing the channels through which it moved.

Shipping Losses During The War

NEW YORK, Oct. 29.—(AP)—With 19 ships known to have been sunk since Oct. 19, the number of vessels lost in the war has passed the 2,000 mark the Associated Press said Saturday in a summary of its shipping loss records.

The records compiled by the news agency from a welter of claims and counter-claims, showed that 31 nations have lost 3,094 vessels—the average of about 2-1/2 ships a day—for a total merchant and naval tonnage of 7,548,894.

Accompanying this high toll was the total of 18,108 lives lost and 3,318 persons missing, according to the AP records. Submarines, planes and warships accounted for 1,075 ships, the records showed; mines for 252 and other or unknown causes for 677.

Britain has been the big loser, 875 of her naval and merchant vessels having been sent to the bottom according to the figures. Her allies Norway and Greece, are shown to have lost 225 and 115, respectively, while the conflict has cost her enemies, Germany and Italy, 145 and 108 ships, respectively.

Sweden has been the hardest hit neutral, losing 118, the records show. While 11 United States-owned ships have gone down only four have flown the American flag, a total sailing under the colors of Panama. Fifteen ships of the latter registry have been sunk.

Nazi Failure Is Predicted

MONTREAL, Oct. 28.—(CP)—All Hitler's military achievements of the last year, and all his remaining military possibilities will be of no avail because they serve to deplete his strength while he still avoids Great Britain, Dr. Otto Strasser, noted anti-Nazi and row chairman of the free German movement, told a meeting of the people's forum, here tonight.

Only by defeating Britain, he said, could Hitler win the final victory.

Toward the end of 1941 or in the beginning of 1942, Hitler may advance on the Mosul oil fields and Suez," Dr. Strasser said, "possibly he may reach both destinations.

"Or, like Napoleon, he may attempt a unification of Europe; eventually he might even arrive at a state of superficial law and order. By threats and force he might prevail upon Spain and Portugal to participate in the new system, and thus acquire north and west African bases for the battle of the Atlantic. He might even dream of an advance upon India.

"It is possible that he may do all this," Dr. Strasser warned, "but so long as the British Isles are not occupied and the connections between Britain and the United States
