The Great Ocean Liner Breaks All Atlantic Records For Average Speed, And For the Long Course Trip.

NEW YORK, May 22.—(Special)—Trans-Atlantic records for average speed and for the shortest trip over a long course were broken by the Cunard liner Lusitania which arrived here today.

Guopkoff's challenge was the aftermath of a quarrel which took place between him and Professor Milukoff, the latter branding as false a statement which the Octoberist leader had made.
