THE PROSPECTS OF PEACE.

M. Witte, chief of the Russian peace plenipotentiaries is probably the foremost statesman of Russia today in the estimation of the civilized world. He is in common with Count Lamsdorf, now Foreign Minister were both opposed to the war with Japan, and both may now be reasonably supposed to be really desirous of peace. But in an interview with the Associated Press at St. Petersburg before his departure for Washington M. Witte expressed himself as very doubtful whether the approaching conference will result in a treaty of peace. From the high character of the man these views are generally accepted as a candid expression of his real views, although there is still a possibility that he may have in mind the thought of influencing the counsels of Japan toward moderation. M. Witte apparently believes that Japan will insist upon terms and conditions which Russia will feel it to be impossible to grant. He is convinced that the internal troubles of Russia will pass away, and that the hard terms which she expects Japan to insist upon will unite the Russian people in a patriotic determination to continue the war. He knows Russia and the Russian people well and hence his views so frankly expressed have produced a profound impression. The interview has also called forth much press opinion as to what are likely to be the terms which Japan may insist upon and to which Russia will not submit. These are generally supposed to be the payment of a big indemnity, the restriction of Russia's naval armament in the East, the cession of Sakhalin and the demolition of the fortifications of Vladivostok. It is thought it may be assumed that Russia will be willing to evacuate Manchuria, cancel her lease of Port Arthur, cede Sakhalin to Japan and acknowledge the independence of Korea with a recognition of a protectorate by Japan. How much more than this Japan will demand is yet unknown, although an indemnity sufficient to cover the cost of the war is anticipated. Vladivostok would be almost useless to Japan in time of peace, and the possession of Sakhalin so encloses it from the seaward side that without a formidable Russian fleet located there the Russian naval station would be no serious menace to Japan. Still it is quite possible that M. Witte's pessimistic outlook may prove too true. The negotiations may fail and the war be continued indefinitely, an outcome for which Japan at least is not unprepared.

A SENSIBLE KING.

King Oscar of Sweden is seventy-six years of age and has reigned thirty-three years. He is naturally displeased with his Norwegian subjects for their secession, but he told a German editor the other day in an interview that he has no desire to have them whipped into subjection. "I have forgiven the Norwegians," declares the King, "and hope the Swedish nation will act wisely, for it would hang a millstone round its own neck if it upheld the union by force and initiated a military occupation of Norway." These are kindly and wise words. Sweden is much the stronger of the two nations and could probably compel Norway to remain in the union. But such compulsion would be costly in blood and treasure, and the union if restored at the bayonet point would neither be strong nor conducive to the happiness of the two peoples.

King Oscar is wise and there is reason to believe that the Swedish Riksdag will follow his peaceful counsels. Thus the revolution in Norway seems likely to pass without bloodshed, and without arousing those feelings of bitterness which war always brings in its train. It may even be hoped that at some future day the union may be restored by mutual desire. It is conceivable that Denmark might also be brought into union with Sweden and Norway, forming a maritime nation of ten millions of people with much of common interest and sympathy and the better able to maintain their independence than three small separate states could possibly be. In the meantime there is much admiration about the world not unmixed with sympathy, for the grand old man who rules in Stockholm over a narrow Kingdom, cultivating a spirit of forgiveness and giving peaceful counsel.

GOING TO OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, July 17.—The meteorological observatory at Toronto, and nearly all the members of the staff now at Toronto, will be transferred to Ottawa a year hence. This is the decision which has been reached by the cabinet. The Toronto University authorities have pressed so earnestly for the ground now occupied by the observatory in Queen's park, and this, coupled with the fact that the observatory at Appleton is so entirely inadequate for the purpose of the service, that it has been deemed advisable to transfer the weather bureau to the capital, where it will be in closer touch with the dominion observatory and the department. A special building for the purpose of the meteorological bureau will be erected in this city, so that the staff may have accommodation which will enable them to render even better service to the public. M. W. F. Stupart, director of the weather bureau, has been here this week in connection with the proposed change.

ATTEMPT TO MURDER ADMIRAL.

NAPLES, July 17.—An attempt was made early this morning to murder Admiral Mirabello, brother of Admiral Mirabelli the Italian Minister of Marine, who is residing at Portica, a small coasting and fishing port and residential town on the Bay of Naples. The Admiral's wife was seriously injured, while defending her husband.
