ONE of Charlottetown's oldest and best known residents was suddenly removed yesterday morning in the person of Heyman P. Terlizick, the well known agent for periodicals and Canadian newspapers, Mr. Terlizick though in his 82nd year was in apparently good health and was about as usual yesterday morning. About ten o'clock he left his home on Bayfield Street to go to the market to do his usual buying on market day. When just past Hooper's corner on the Melpeque Road he fell to the sidewalk and was dead in a few moments. The late Mr. Terlizick was born here in 1822 and for many years conducted a general store on Queen St. but his building was destroyed by the big fire in 1860. He leaves to mourn one daughter, Miss Mary residing here and one son John in Dundas besides a sister in Calgary.

THE MARKETS.

The market was well supplied yesterday with dairy produce, vegetables, etc. Fowl was especially plentiful in geese, chickens and ducks.

Geese brought from 75c to \$1.00, chickens, 50-60c a pair, ducks, 65-80c a pair, wild geese, \$1.00 to \$1.25 each.

Butter per lb, tub, sold at 30c and in print 22 to 23c Eggs per doz, were slightly advanced, selling from 21 to 22c.

The price of potatoes fell a little lower, bringing from 18 to 20c per bus. Hay per cwt, loose, remains at 65 to 75c and pressed per ton \$14.00. Oats were somewhat higher at 37 to 40c per bus. Straw pressed per ton sold at \$8.00.

Pork, dressed, per lb, according to quality sold from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2.

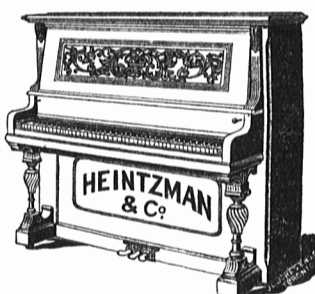
