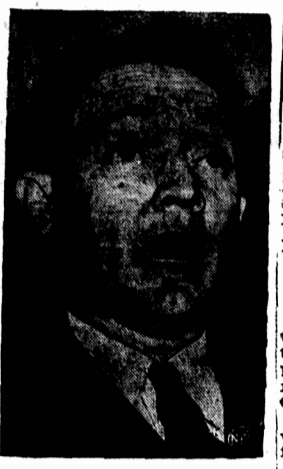

**TRURO, N.S., Feb. 26 (CP).**—Rev. Perry F. Rookwood, minister of St. James Presbyterian Church here, has been notified to appear before a March 4 meeting of the Halifax-Lunenburg Presbytery to answer charges of "following a divisive course" in a series of sermons last fall. It was announced tonight before a March 4 meeting of the series of sermons in which he had criticized certain aspects of church practice and in one sermon he criticized an action of a Quebec meeting of Protestant churches in expressing sympathy in connection with the illness of the late Cardinal Villeneuve. Later a fire was reported in the basement of Mr. Rookwood's home and it said that some of his sermons had been burned.

Notice of Mr. Rookwood's impending hearing was given tonight in the Church Bulletin which announced him to appear before the Presbytery to answer the charge of following a divisive course and acting in a manner contrary to the dignity of a minister of the church. It said his conduct was contrary to the laws of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and inconsistent with his position as a minister of the gospel.

**Reviews Activities of Fishermen's Cooperative**

Savings effected by co-operative marketing were emphasized in the annual report of President Austin R. Bell, White Sands, at the annual meeting yesterday of the P.E.I. Fishermen's Central Co-operative Association, Ltd. Following is the text of his report:

**Report of the President**

"It is with a great deal of pleasure that I welcome the delegates to this annual meeting, and I am pleased to note that there is a good representation from all member Co-operatives in attendance.

"It was with deepest regret that we learned of the death of our former president, Mr. Napoleon Arsenault, who had been president of the Central since it was formed until August last year when he resigned. He was succeeded with the Co-operative movement in Prince Edward Island since its earliest days and was a good organizer among the fishermen. His passing was a great loss, not only to his bereaved family, but also to all fishermen who have benefited from his sincere efforts to obtain for them a better standard of living through co-operative organization. In memory of the late Mr. Arsenault, I think it is fitting that we now observe a period of one minute's silence August last year. Mr. M. A Farmer was acting as manager of the Central in a part time capacity. It was decided to secure a full time manager in order to make preparations for an active business year this coming year. Applications were called for in the Press, and at a meeting of the board of directors the applications were reviewed, and Mr. R. B. MacNeill had just returned from overseas, having joined the army as a Private, and served in both Italy and N.W. Europe campaigns. On discharge he held the rank of Major and had been employed in the army as a Staff Officer for the last two years of his service. His last appointment was as director of education for the Canadian Occupational Force in Germany, where he had to organize the complete educational program for all the Canadian troops there, and we are very fortunate in securing such a capable and efficient manager to carry on our business.

**Nine Co-operatives**

"There have not been any new Co-operatives join the Central since last year, and the present membership consists of nine Co-operatives with a total individual membership of 256 fishermen. Each of these nine Co-ops. has subscribed towards the share capital, some having several hundred shares, and have only the one share which entitles them to membership.

"We would like to increase this share capital considerably this year so that there will be some funds available to carry on the business. The Central will be more concerned with car-load quantities of merchandise and supplies and in order to finance the business, there will have to be more money available either in share capital or in loan capital.

"The past few years have been favourable ones for marketing our fish because of the world-wide need for food for relief purposes. Consequently we have been able to sell our fish to advantage with a price only a better return than we could secure in the open market. The situation is rapidly changing now, and the marketing from now on will be a different matter than it was while there was a steady demand for our fish.

"The world is beginning to get back on its feet again, with an ever increasing production of fish from the fish-producing countries. These countries are always on the alert to find new and better methods of packing and processing fish, and they are now getting into the markets on this continent, and we do our own marketing with this sort of competition, we must also be constantly looking for better methods of handling our fish, more economical means of handling, and for us to hold our own with a superior product.

"The trend in the world markets seems to be towards fresh and fresh-frozen fish since the latter is more readily stored, has small refrigeration equipment that enables them to display the product attractively and to handle fresh fish where it was impossible to do so in the past. With this in mind, we must prepare now to produce the kind of fish that will sell on the market, and also produce a better product as well as a more attractive one.

**Loss of Packing**

"A great deal of money has been lost to the fishermen in the past by packing fish that did not grade a fancy grade. We must not take special care this year to pack only fancy product and so we are not only better off, but we are also to secure a ready sale for Star of the Sea brand fish.

"By marketing fish co-operatively, there is a great saving to the fishermen, which can be illustrated by a case which I take as an example. Last year I visited a Co-operative that was formed in 1946, but which has not yet begun to do their marketing co-operatively. By basing the price of lobsters, on that received by the fishermen in the Murray Harbour Fishermen's Co-operative for the past year, I found on inquiry, that these fishermen lost in the vicinity of \$3000.00 on the year's business by not selling their lobster catch in large quantities co-operatively.

"The work of organization among the fishermen which was carried out by the Central, was limited last year because it is very difficult for the board of directors to afford the time to visit those places where a Co-operative organization was being contemplated

**HOMEMADE TOILET SOAP**

One pound of washing soda, 1 lb. tallow, 1-2 lb. unslacked lime, 1 tablespoon salt, 2 quarts water. Method: Put the soda and lime in a dish, pour over it boiling water, stir until dissolved, let it stand until clear, pour off the clear liquid. Add the grease and salt. Boil 4 hours. Then pour into pans and cool. If it should be inclined to curdle, the lime may be too strong, pour in a little more water and boil again. Add perfume as you like, pour into molds and let harden. Cream rouge 1 teaspoon, ashes of roses perfume makes this a very fine toilet soap.
