PARTY ARRIVE

(Continued from page one) The object of the visit of Capt. Troop and party was in connection with the establishment of a regular passenger service to be conducted by the International Aviation Company between Moncton and Charlottetown. If a suitable field can be secured, Capt. Troop says he will start the service right away. He proposes to leave Moncton at 10.45 a. m., arrive in Charlottetown at 11.30, and leave again at 12, reaching Moncton at 12.45 in time to connect with the outgoing Ocean Limited. The venture is more or less of an experiment but will be continued if the business warrants. A fee of \$15 for the single trip and \$25 for return will be charged.

Speaking of aviation activities at Moncton, Major Price says that there are two organizations functioning, the Moncton Airport Limited and the Moncton Flying Club, both co-operating. They have made an arrangement with a commercial company, the International Aviation Company, the largest in Canada and representing a merger of the Fairchild and several other concerns. That company, in conjunction with the Flying Club, is starting a school for fliers and already between 25 and 30 men have paid their deposit and will start work this week.

Capt. Troop, who is one of the instructors and who is directing the preparatory operations, has been in Moncton for several weeks. Another instructor, Capt. Parkinson, will arrive from Grand Mere. Aviation Arrangements at Moncton The question of starting a club according to the Dominion Government regulations was discussed but the Moncton people thought that they could do better by coming to an arrangement with the International people as it would cost the students less and the Club itself would be relieved from a considerable amount of responsibility and expense. A forty acre field has been secured about a mile and a half from Moncton and this has been graded and levelled and is now all ready for starting instruction. There are three machines on the ground, the Fairchild machine that came over here today and the Moths. The Government has consented to put the roads in shape between the city and the field and the municipality of Moncton are providing the machinery and labor.

Arrangements for the operation of a fish collecting and buying service on the North Coast of Prince Edward Island were reported recently in The Guardian. The following additional details will be of interest. OTTAWA, May 27.—Arrangements have been made by the Fisheries Branch for the maintenance of a packet service in Prince Edward Island, and between L'Ardoise, Cape Breton, and Halifax, this summer and autumn, the latter by the motor schooner Petite. In subsidizing this service the Fisheries Branch is acting on a recommendation of the Royal Commission on Fisheries.

Made This Week Under the arrangements now made by the branch with Captain L. R. Verge, owner and master of the Petite, the schooner will carry salt and other supplies to the fishermen, and will transport their fish to Halifax. The first trip of the service was made this week when the Petite carried seventy tons of salt to L'Ardoise. Approximately twenty-four round trips will be made by the vessel during the season.

Propaganda Methods. S. O. Heath, executive official of the United Kingdom Alliance, told that his organization corresponds to the Anti-Saloon League in America. But members of the latter would look upon the Alliance as a very tame group with most non-militant methods. It is stopped by the British election laws, both from promising support to any individual candidate if he agrees to be bone-dry, and from threatening to defeat him if he will not so agree. It has no right to spend money for or against such a candidate. The Anti-Saloon League methods, which are entirely legal in America, would be punishable in this country with fine or imprisonment. No attempt to evade these electoral laws could be made, said Mr. Heath of the United Kingdom Alliance, for they are impartially enforced against both wets and dries.

Such an electoral system, supplemented as it now is by the tri-party agreement, will make the liquor question a very minor factor in this campaign. Perhaps the most striking difference of all between the present stage of the temperance movement in England and the corresponding stage in America is that here there are no great expectations as to the effect of the new women voters on the problem. When the United States Federal Government granted women suffrage it was taken for granted in advance by many persons that it would assure the election of the sort of men to make a success of prohibition. The Nineteenth Amendment to the Constitution was looked upon as giving effect to the Eighteenth.

But here in England, on the eve of a great general election in which more than 5,000,000 women less than 30 years old will have the franchise for the first time, there is no comment or speculation whatever as to what these new voters will do in reference to temperance or any other change.

COLLECTING OF FISH WILL BE STARTED

Packet Service Between P. E. I. and N. S. Points Will be Operated.

Arrangements for the operation of a fish collecting and buying service on the North Coast of Prince Edward Island were reported recently in The Guardian. The following additional details will be of interest. OTTAWA, May 27.—Arrangements have been made by the Fisheries Branch for the maintenance of a packet service in Prince Edward Island, and between L'Ardoise, Cape Breton, and Halifax, this summer and autumn, the latter by the motor schooner Petite. In subsidizing this service the Fisheries Branch is acting on a recommendation of the Royal Commission on Fisheries.

Made This Week Under the arrangements now made by the branch with Captain L. R. Verge, owner and master of the Petite, the schooner will carry salt and other supplies to the fishermen, and will transport their fish to Halifax. The first trip of the service was made this week when the Petite carried seventy tons of salt to L'Ardoise. Approximately twenty-four round trips will be made by the vessel during the season.

Reduces Cost Heretofore the L'Ardoise fishermen for the most part, have had to obtain delivery of their supplies and transport their fish by way of St. Peter's. The result has been added cost and loss of time in operations, and, in some instances, because of extra handlings and delay, there has been deterioration of the fish consigned to market. Local conditions at L'Ardoise made impossible a satisfactory steamer service.

Arrangement for the operation of a fish collecting and buying service on the north coast of Prince Edward Island this summer and autumn is provided for in a contract which has been made by the Fisheries Branch with the international Fresh Fish Corporation, Limited, of Georgetown, Prince Edward Island. Under the contract, the Corporation's steamer "Amla," equipped with refrigerating compartments, will carry on a collecting service covering the fishing points between Alberton and Georgetown or Souris and the catch will be purchased by the company or carried to other buyers at the terminals of the route, at the will of the fishermen. Under the contract the corporation agrees to pay not less than one cent a pound for fish as they come from the water, and not less than two and a half cents a pound for lightly salted fish.

SAYS TOURIST TRAFFIC WILL BE INCREASED

Judge Arsenault Well Pleased With Visit of Commissioner Burnaby and Prof. McPhee.

"The Commission can't perform miracles in a few months," said Mr. Justice Arsenault, president of the Publicity Association in an interview with the Guardian concerning last week's visit of Trade Commissioner Burnaby and Professor McPhee, "but we can anticipate results in the future from its activities. It has not been long enough in existence to exert any influence on this year's tourist traffic. In the next and succeeding years, however, we can rely on its co-operation to a considerable extent in bringing more tourists from Ontario to this province. Mr. Burnaby is a live wire and he has created an interest in the Maritimes in Toronto."

In Judge Arsenault's opinion, the presence in Toronto of an office where our literature can be sent and where people can enquire is of invaluable assistance in conveying to the people of Ontario, knowledge of the enviable locations and facilities which Prince Edward Island can offer those who seek a pleasant resort for vacation. Joint advertising with New Brunswick and Nova Scotia which the Commission has inaugurated, he said, will mean cheaper and better publicity for this province.

Judge Arsenault was also favourably impressed with the Commission as a medium of trade between the Maritimes and Central Canada and the great possibility of increasing business with importers in Toronto.
