ENTERTAINMENT.—One of the most enjoyable of the splendid lists of entertainments in the Parish Hall at Seven Mile Bay was put on Wednesday, February 23rd when the Knights of Columbus of the parishes of Borden and Seven Mile Bay staged a delightful function. LABOR LEADER PLANS TRIP TO AMERICA LONDON, Feb. 28.—J. Ramsay MacDonald, former prime minister, is considering visiting America in April. Mr. MacDonald, according to his secretary, has wanted for a long time to make the trip, having received many invitations from friends. It is not likely that the visit could be a long one. He would like to make it around Easter. He thinks the sea voyage would benefit his health. ### Eversen Wins World Title

TAMMERFORS, Finland, Feb. 28.—Evensen of Norway, won the world's skating championship here today. He retained the 10,000 metres title and took second place in the 1500 metres event, thus securing the biggest aggregate of points. Clas Thunberg of Finland, was next in line for the championship, and Carlsen of Norway, third. Evensen captured the 10,000 metres in 18 minutes 5 2/10 seconds, Thunberg won the 1500 metres in 2 minutes 24 1/10 seconds.
