### "MAKING EXCUSES"

A correspondent signing himself "Unionist" wrote to the Guardian recently under the above heading, alleging that attempts were being made to evade the Military Service Act, by claiming exemption for sons as necessary in their father's business or on the land. These aspersions have caused very considerable indignation in Tignish, which has done nobly since the war started. The many calls for funds in connection with the world war have always found the people of English in the foremost ranks with handsome patriotic donations. Nor was Tignish behind in the matter of enlistment there being no fewer than 102 voluntary enlistments, while, on the passing of the Military Service Act, those who were affected registered and responded like men. Very few exemptions were asked for and when not granted the young men responded without demur. The few exemptions granted were absolutely justifiable. The Guardian knows that the people of Tignish do not deserve the condemnation passed upon them by "Unionist" and regrets that as columns have been allowed to be used by an anonymous correspondent for the purpose of making uncalculated insinuations.

### WAR APPROPRIATION BILL PASSED

OTTAWA, April 25.—Earlier in the afternoon the third reading was given without further discussion to the \$500,000,000 war appropriation bill. At the evening session when the House was in supply there was considerable discussion in regard to the new Parliament Buildings now in course of construction.

### NEW PARLIAMENT BUILDING NOW READY FOR NEXT SESSION

Hon. F. B. Carvell stated definitely that the building would not be ready for the next session of Parliament but that it would be utilized as completed for office purposes. The expenditure up to date he said had been \$3,000,000. It would reach the \$5,000,000 mark by the time the building is completed.

### CANADIAN EGGS FOR CANADIAN SOLDIERS

TORONTO, April 25.—On the morning that Vimy Ridge was taken by the Canadians the officers of the 19th Battalion ate eggs laid in Canada, less than one month before. The acknowledgement to the sender, Col. W. T. Gregory of Leamington stated that the eggs had arrived without one being broken. This encouraged him to send more eggs to his friends in France and about one hundred boxes containing the dainty and nutritious edible followed, the sender requesting with each package that word be sent to him as to their condition on arrival. "Replies came along promptly," he said to the Daily News "and I have yet to earn that one egg did not reach its destination broken."

### COL. LABATT'S PENSION

OTTAWA, April 25.—A return tabled in parliament late yesterday in regard to the pension awarded Col. R. S. Labatt, a member of the pensions board, who draws a salary of \$5,000 per annum, shows that he is also in receipt of a total disability pension of \$1,800 per annum, with \$120 per annum extra for each of his two children. On November 27 last Col. Labatt was given a total disability pension to run for six months until further medical examination. On April 4 on recommendation of a re-examining board he was granted a permanent pension of the full amount as stated above. The board states that Col. Labatt is suffering from valvular disease of the heart, which prevents him from earning his living to the full extent.

### CANDY SUGAR REDUCED

OTTAWA, April 25.—It is expected that the Canada food board at Ottawa will issue an order within the next few days reducing the amount of sugar to be used for candy by about fifty percent. The matter has been under consideration for some time, and manufacturers from all parts of Canada have been in Ottawa during the past week.

### Returned Soldiers Arrive This Side

CANADIAN ATLANTIC PORT, April 25.—A steamer having on board 736 returned officers, N. C. O.'s, and men of the C. E. F., arrived here last night and docked this morning.

### Incendiary Fires In Lima, Ohio

LIMA, Ohio, April 25.—Federal agents today are investigating three fires which broke out simultaneously in the Lake Erie and Western railway shops here last night and practically destroyed the plant valued at \$500,000. One arrest has been made and it is said others may be made during the day. Property loss included at least ten locomotives urgently needed in war work, a new train of troop coaches just completed and a score of other coaches. Ten thousand dollars worth of Liberty bonds subscriptions were burnt in the office of the shops.

### BRITISH INFLECT SERIOUS LOSSES ON BULGARIANS

LONDON, April 25.—New successes for the Allies against the Bulgarians are reported. The British inflicted very serious losses on the enemy west of Lake Doiran while the French drove him from the heights further west.
