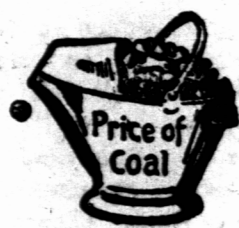

SUM'SIDE AND WEST

The Latest News From Prince County.

CRESCENT Lodge K. of P. meet tonight at 8 p. m. Conferring third rank. Other important business. A full attendance is requested.

Miss Palmer who has been visiting in Summerside the guest of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Wright, left yesterday on return to Fredericton.

MASONIC.—Regular meeting of Mount Lebanon Lodge, No. 6, A. F. and A. M. this evening at 8 o'clock. A full attendance is requested. Work on second degree.

SPEAKING OF the dry time, a farmer of Lot 16, told in Summerside that a day or two ago he lost two of his cattle by drowning in a puncheon of water. On first hearing the story it sounded incredible, but on further inquiry it was learned that two calves while in the act of drinking from low water in a spring were, it is supposed, pushed into the puncheon—which surrounded the spring—by some of the older of their kind. It is not known whether the cows meant mischief, or did the deed through mischief, but it might have been that they wished to swell the water so that they might easier quench their thirst. However an inquest was not held.

The regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last night the Mayor and all the Councillors with the exception of Councillor Rogers present. Councillor Morrison on behalf of committee on the painting of market building reported having closed the contract with Mr. R. E. Sobey to paint the building with three coats of paint for the sum of \$205. He referred to some criticism on the part of some citizens in respect to the contract. Councillor Morris moved that the report be accepted and the action of the committee be approved of by the Council. Coun. Dickieson was not satisfied with the report. The committee was asked to interview Mr. Sobey and obtain if possible a reasonable reduction. He thought that two coats would be sufficient. Councillor Goss was of the opinion that the committee did just as they were instructed by the Council. Councillor Morse moved that the committee be given power to go ahead with the work. Councillor Waugh moved that the report be laid over until next week. This was seconded by Councillor Dickieson. Councillor Goss moved an amendment that the matter be settled at once. Councillor Morrison, seconded the motion, which was passed, Councillors Dickieson and Waugh voting in the negative. Councillor Goss moved that the contract be given to Mr. Sobey at the figures mentioned in the Committee's report. Motion seconded by Coun. Morrison and carried, Councillors Dickieson and Waugh voting in the negative. Councillor Dickieson moved, seconded by Councillor Waugh, that Mr. John Crozier be appointed inspector of the work. The motion was defeated. A petition from Mr. John H. Boates asking that he be exempted from the milk vendor's tax in consideration of his paying taxes on property in the town and is thus placed at a disadvantage with the non-resident milk vendors. The petition was endorsed by a number of citizens. Coun. Goss stated that the by-law respecting this act was made when there were none but non-resident milk pedlars. As Mr. Boates was a resident and a taxpayer he should be exempted at least a part of this tax. Coun. Morris thought that the tax was an unfair one, that milk vendors had to pay tax to pay tax that the vegetable or meat pedlar. Either all alike or none should pay a tax. He moved that the matter be laid over for one month. Motion carried. After hearing the street committee reports re the opening of the new street from Granville to Cemetery Road he decided on motion that as it appeared necessary to purchase a small portion of more property for the opening of the new road to the cemetery that the matter be looked into and a special meeting be called for that purpose. It was decided on motion that the name of the new street from Granville to Cemetery Road be called Victoria St. also that the street mentioned in the plan of Summerside as Pleasant street be known by that name. Coun. Dickieson thought that there should be an electric light placed on Water St. between Granville Street and the railway crossing. He moved that a committee be appointed to examine the place and also to consider the necessity of locating oil lamps on some of the dark streets of the town and report at a special meeting of the council. Motion carried.
