The instruction has been given by Capt. Forester, of Toronto, assisted by a sergeant, two corporals and four privates. They will open a cavalry school in Toronto on the 10th inst. The officers attending the school here received instruction in saddling, bridging and sword exercise, mounted and dismounted. Some of them had never been on horse-back previously but although having only 11 rides their progress was wonderful. Their examination begins to-day. Every field officer must qualify before the end of the year. No promotions can be had nor field appointments received by officers who do not qualify.

THE death occurred in this city yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock of Mr. John P. Sullivan, ex-M.P.P. of St. Peter's Bay. The remains were taken last night to the residence of Chief Justice Sullivan, brother of the deceased, and will be taken to St. Peter's by this morning train. Yesterday's Patriot speaking of his illness says: Mr. Sullivan came to town in the eastern train this morning. He was accompanied by his niece, and complained of no feeling well. After arrival in town Mr. Sullivan transacted a little business, and his illness increasing he went into Messrs. Reddin Bros' Drug Store, Victoria Row, and sat down. As he appeared seriously ill, Dr. Conroy was summoned and Mr. Sullivan was laid on a temporary lounge in the rear of the store. The doctor and several of the suffering man's friends did all that medical skill and tender attendance could do to relieve Mr. Sullivan. Chief Justice Sullivan, his brother, was telephoned for and was soon on the scene. Mr. Sullivan's people in St. Peter's were also notified and some of the relations came to town by this afternoon's train. At time of going to press Mr. Sullivan was slowly sinking and no hope was entertained of his recovery. Mr. Sullivan for some time represented St. Peter's in the Provincial Legislature, and is known as a moderate, unassuming, honorable gentleman. His sudden illness is learned with general regret and scores of enquiries were made to-day concerning his condition.
