THE AFRICAN CABLE SERVICE.

All the cables connecting Europe with South Africa, are under British control, and it is announced from Washington that the British Government have informed the representatives of the different nations that all official as well as private cablegrams to and from Pretoria will hereafter be subjected to official censorship. This is thought to be intended to prevent Dr. Leyds and other Boer agents from communicating with the officials at Pretoria. [Cipher telegrams will be refused transmission except such as emanate from, or are directed to the British authorities in Britain or South Africa.

This purpose is likely to cause some friction among unfriendly powers, though it is within the right of the British Government to enforce it. At the international Convention of 1884 in which, among other matters the neutrality of oceanic cables was arranged for, the British representatives distinctly reserved the point, in the following words: "The Government of Her Majesty understands Article 15 of the Treaty in this sense: In time of war a belligerent signatory of the Convention shall be free to act in relation to the cables as if the Convention did not exist."

A correspondent of the St. John Sun who has been worried with chain letters, writes: "Deliver us from these chains. Or if you must forge them, send them to Kruger and Joubert. If Oom Paul gets a few chain letters he will surrender rather than copy them."

There has been some concern in regard to the S. S. Milwaukee which sailed from Halifax just previous to a terrible Atlantic storm. As the steamer will not call at Cape Verde, but will proceed direct to Cape Town, it may be weeks before she is heard from.

Dr. Leslie E. Keeley, inventor of the gold cure for inebriety, whose death was announced the other day in our despatches, was for a long time a poor country doctor. He worked at his cure for years before he perfected it, but at length succeeded. The Chicago Tribune says of him:

In the case of the seized American vessel Sabine, which was carrying food stuffs from New York to Delagoa Bay, believed to be for the use of the Boer armies, a settlement has been reached. The British Government purchased the cargo after the decision not to regard food stuffs as contraband of war.
