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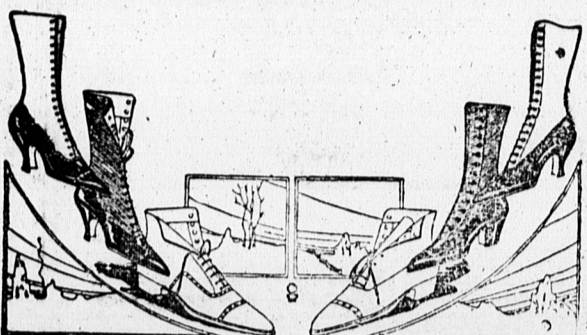

Australian Premier And Dom. Conference

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Aug. 18.—Lord Long of Wraxall states that as president of the Empire Development Union telegram from Mr. Bruce, Prime Minister of Australia, dated Melbourne, July 19:

Information received from the press indicates that various interests are being actively organized to prevent the success of the forthcoming Economic Conference. It is obviously going to be a very difficult task to secure an addition to or extension of preferential tariffs in favour of Dominion goods. Unless this question is boldly faced a sound economic policy for the Empire is impossible.

In my opinion, it is most essential that propagandists from the other side must be met argument by argument. I know all that your organization has done and is doing now, but I would respectfully suggest, if you have not already considered the matter, that you link up with all the organizations likely to be of assistance and commence a campaign in favour of Empire goods which will culminate in the visit of the Dominion Prime Ministers. I shall personally do whatever I can before and after my arrival to place before the people of Britain fairly all the important aspects of Imperial Preference. I invite and shall welcome your valued assistance in a task which, to my mind, will determine the future destiny of the Empire.

Lord Long adds: "I am sure that the whole Empire will agree with Mr. Bruce in his view of the critical importance of the Imperial Conference that is to be held in October, and it is of vital consequence that the preferential policy which has been unanimously accepted by all the Governments in all parts of the British Empire, should be effectively explained to the country as Mr. Bruce desires."

Says Drinking Era at Sea Has Passed

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—T. D. Smith, chief steward to the White Star liner Adriatic, who has been thirty-five years in the North Atlantic trade, said just before sailing for Liverpool the last trip, that drinking among passengers at sea has been steadily declining for the last twenty years.

"It is not because liquor costs have gone up," he said, "but chiefly because the present generation does not drink beer, wine or spirituous liquors as its forbears did. Efficiency in business, with telephones, wireless, radio, taxicabs, electrical devices and the general demand for more speed has destroyed the old idea of doing business in the forenoon and devoting the rest of the day and night to drinking.

"When I first went to sea," Mr. Smith continued, "there was a different class of travellers crossing the Atlantic. The ships were smaller and were so tossed about in rough weather that only hardy individuals cared for the north Atlantic trip, except in May, June and July, when there were prospects of fine weather. Some hard drink toppers in those days could drink all day and most of the night. They were never drunk.

"They usually breakfasted at 11 a. m. and the meal generally consisted of deviled bones with champagne. "Whisky at that time cost 90 cents a bottle, gin 50 cents, rum 50 cents, good red or white table wine 50 cents, and champagne was \$2 a quart. Beer, ale or stout was 6 cents a bottle, and a whisky or brandy with soda water could be obtained in the first class smoking room for 12 cents. The best cut pipe tobacco on the ship was 85 cents a pound.

"Passengers bought spirits by the bottle and kept them in the swinging racks over their seats at table. At dinner time in the first class dining saloon thirty years ago champagne was seen on every table. "When the 6 o'clock dinner was in fashion the passengers had a light supper served in the saloon about 9.30 o'clock. It consisted of griddled sardines, marrow bones or deviled bones, Welsh rabbits and wine, stout, ale and whiskies and sodas. Despite all this drinking, it was unusual to see a passenger intoxicated.

"The passengers we had crossing between Liverpool and New York thirty-five years ago were harder than the present generation of ocean travellers. They could eat and drink anything at any time and never seemed to suffer from the many complaints that assail passengers today.

"Mr. Smith has been a chief steward since 1898 and is the senior in the White Star fleet.

The British Premier Seen Through French Eyes

(By Dominion News Service) PARIS, Aug. 19.—A delightful personal sketch of Mr. Baldwin from the mouth of an esteemed "friend" is given by N. Stephens Launne in the Matin. "You don't know Baldwin," says this intimate friend, "nor for the matter of that does anybody else. He is a man apart, who is well worth describing.

"Baldwin is not fond of politics. He regards politics very much as a motorist looks on the turbines in his road. Politics do not allow you to see very far in front of you," he said one day in public, and privately he added that the politicians "break the neck and break the heart of their country."

"He likes neither theories nor philosophical ideas nor doubt. The hesitations of an Arthur Balfour seem to him to be something unthinkable and the versatility of a Robert Cecil appears to be calculations. He regards both of them very highly, however, for they are men of classical culture and the classical culture he drew from Trinity College, Cambridge, the Premier looks upon as the highest of all good.

"Then too he is not very fond of talking. It is freely stated that Montagu Norman is the confidant of his most secret thoughts, his Pythias in short. When the pair are together, however, and they often are, they will not exchange twenty sentences in a quarter of an hour, but each understands half a word from the other. They comprehend each other merely by looking at each other. Half a dozen figures are to them the key of a long meditation.

"Further, Baldwin loves books. His library is his favourite haunt. He runs there whenever he has an hour to spare just as Lloyd George runs to the golf links or into a pulpit. He would willingly spend his week-end in the library. The only kind of physical exercise he likes is a solitary walk in his park with his dogs.

"Finally he loves old pictures and old furniture. He has a remarkable collection of both in his house in Eaton-square, but very few people have seen them, for he has not much liking for receiving crowds of people or for display, and Mrs. Baldwin likes such things still less. It is stated of her that when their silver wedding was approaching recently and the Premier asked his wife what kind of a present he should give to her, Mrs. Baldwin replied: "I should like a cheque for £1,000 in order to endow a bed in Worcester Hospital." She received her cheque at once and the hospital got its bed."
