STEEL SHIP IN PORT—The C. S. "Beaconour" arrived in port Monday afternoon from Quebec, in route to Halifax, N. S. Somers, and Percy Hunter, these four making the supreme sacrifice also Russel Inglis, Preston Kennedy, Robert Jardine, William Delaney, Edmund Stavert, and Alexander Stewart the six men who returned.

LORD CAVAN ENGAGED LONDON, Nov. 20.—The engagement is announced in London of General the Earl of Cavan, Chief of the Imperial General Staff, with Lady Joan, daughter of the youngest daughter of the fifth Earl of Stratford and of Emily Countess of Stratford, and widow of Captain the Hon. Andrew S. Mulholland, Lord Cavan, whose first wife, daughter of the late Mr. G. B. Crawley, died in 1920, was 57 years old on October 16. He served with distinction in the South African War with his battalion of the Grenadier Guards, and after commanding the 4th Guards Brigade in the original Expeditionary Force, was appointed Major-General of the Guards Division on its formation in France in 1915. He was given the 14th Corps (containing his former Division) in the following year and as G. O. C. the British Forces in Italy, rendered invaluable service in the critical autumn of 1917. Lady Joan Mulholland is Lady-in-Waiting to Princess Mary Viscountess Lascelles. She spent some time at Rideau Hall, Ottawa, during the Duke of Devonshire's term of office there.

Of perhaps greater importance is that with its very ample assets the Bank of Montreal has been able to adequately meet the demands of industry and commerce and at the same time keep its liquid assets at a ratio of 64.09 per cent. of liabilities to the public.

At the end of the fiscal year to October 31st, total assets amounted to \$713,569,566, and of this amount liquid assets were \$417,819,493. Included in this, cash on hand amounts to \$124,538,190, of which \$47,244,865 is in gold and silver coin. Cash holdings alone were equivalent to 19.10 per cent. of public liabilities. In addition the balances due by other banks and call loans stand at \$189,182,947.
