ROCKEFELLER TO GIVE AWAY WEALTH WHILE HE LIVES.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—That John D. Rockefeller plans to spend his millions on a still greater scale than ever in the cause of education, charity and other beneficent objects, was made clear yesterday when Senator Gallinger introduced a bill to incorporate the Rockefeller Foundation, which will have headquarters in Washington. The incorporators are John D. Rockefeller, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., Fred. T. Gates, Starr J. Murphy and Charles O. Heydt. The organization will be a rival to the Carnegie Foundation, which is established to pension teachers and advance the cause of education. The Rockefeller Foundation will have for its object the promotion of "all of the elements of human progress," including education and charity. Mr. Rockefeller has already spent \$52,000,000 through the general education board. He proposes to go still deeper into the matter of giving for causes that will uplift civilization. "Mr. Rockefeller proposes to spend his millions on a scale equalled by no other living man," said Senator Gallinger. The bill introduced by Senator Gallinger was referred to the senate district committee. It will be taken up at an early date and will probably be passed. The bill thus sets forth the wide scope of the objects

SAY CANADA MUST YIELD ON TARIFF.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—A proclamation granting to Austria-Hungary the minimum rates under the Payne-Aldrich tariff law was signed today by Secretary of State Knox and was presented to the President for his signature. Next to France, Austria-Hungary has been the most formidable obstacle in the way of tariff adjustment.

Negotiations with France still continue, but no definite conclusion has been reached. Little doubt is expressed, however, that the French Government must recede from its present attitude in some important particulars, before it is allowed the rates given the other great European powers. Conferences with the French Ambassador are held at frequent intervals, but so far the results are not altogether satisfactory. The tariffs of about forty countries and dependencies remain to be considered before the entire list is disposed of. This must be done within the present month so that these countries may enjoy our minimum or schedule rates. The tariff commissioners on behalf of the United States now en route with them will have their first conference with the Canadian premier and the minister of finance tomorrow. There is said to be no doubt that Canada grants France, under her new treaty with that country, lower rates on certain of her products than are at present given like products of the United States, and that this discrimination must be removed before a final settlement can be reached.

PARIS, March 5.—French protected interests are making a desperate fight to prevent the government from conceding the minimum tariff to the United States. They are willing that the government should extend the list of articles enjoying the minimum rate under expired agreements to a limited number of other American products coming into competition with those of foreign countries, but they maintain that it is preferable to fight than to yield the entire minimum.
