He said that "if this is only a question of the south Tyrol, it would seem to me the most proper commission is to raise it before a committee. If the conference wants to invite Austria it can do it, but the Soviet delegation does not think it is necessary."

(Continued from Page 1) shortly after reporters reached the camp. Photographers had not been allowed an hour earlier and as the newspapermen waited at the gate, barricaded with barbed wire, Isaac Cohen, 26, who said he was a former Polish partisan, came forward. He asked C. Donald, special government welfare officer conducting the press tour, whether the refugees could speak to the reporters. "No," replied Donald. Cohen, chairman of a six-man committee elected by the refugees to organize the camp, hurried away. Soon afterward the demonstrators began to gather near the entrance of the camp. One unfurled a Palestinian flag and the refugees streamed toward the camp gate. At a later mass meeting various speakers, using Hebrew, Yiddish, Spanish, Greek, Czech and German so that all could understand, pledged themselves to the slogan "Palastine or die." They ended the meeting with the singing of the Jewish anthem.
