**A New Railway Service**  
Between St. John - Charlottetown  
And Montreal - Charlottetown

The following information has been received by the Publicity Association with reference to additional railway transportation facilities for the coming summer.

Effective on June 7th a parlor car will be operated between Saint John and Charlottetown, leaving St. John at 1.00 p. m. arriving at Charlottetown at 11.15 p. m. first trip leaving Charlottetown June 7th at 6.45 a. m. arriving St. John 5.50 p. m.

Effective concurrently with the summer time table change (June 26th) a through sleeping car will operate between Montreal and Charlottetown, first trip Eastbound June 26th from Montreal on the "Ocean Limited" connecting with No. 40 at Moncton for Charlottetown reaching that point at 11.15 p. m. first westbound from Charlottetown on No. 39 leaving 6.45 a. m. June 26th connecting at Moncton with the "Ocean Limited" for Montreal.

On June 26th the parlor-Cafe car will be discontinued between Tormentine and Charlottetown but will be continued between St. John and Tormentine.

The Pullman service will be given a thorough opportunity of demonstration whether it will turn out satisfactorily and the volume of through traffic will be an important factor as to the period during which it will operate through.

This sleeping car the railway proposes to fully advertise and in this the Publicity Association will cooperate by featuring it in its advertisements and in its literature.

Effective also with the change to the summer time table a third train (in addition to the "Ocean Limited" and to the "Maritime Express") will operate between Montreal and Halifax, as it has been found that owing to increase of tourist traffic the two present passenger trains are too heavy.

An effort is at present being made to have the Scotia operated during the months of July and August to take care of the motor car transportation and the extra weight.

**LEGISLATURE  
SUMMARY**

(Continued from page one)

for an act to amend the  
Trustee Act, 1910, was read a second  
time and committed. Mr. Mc-  
Leod in the chair. The bill was  
agreed to with amendment.

House took recess until 3 o'clock.  
In the afternoon Mr. H. D. Mc-  
Lean continued the debate and in  
part said:

The Minister of Public Works  
has been designated as a young  
and experienced lawyer but his  
sharp counter attack might change  
the opinion of the Opposition. In  
this Legislature many important  
budgets were brought down but  
never before in the history of the  
Province, was there ever brought  
down, such a momentous budget  
as that of Premier Stewart. Mr.  
McLean commented upon the dif-  
ferent excellent items of the Bud-  
get, the generous comparison in  
the Budget between the two Govern-  
ments, in contrast with the incor-  
rect comparison made by the Lead-  
er of the Opposition.

There is no necessity of going  
into the charges made against the  
Government by the Opposition  
which are now four years old.  
Three of those charges now fig-  
ured by the Opposition process are  
that the Government has increased  
the debt; it has done nothing,  
and thirdly it has only imitated the  
Liberals. Mr. McLean clearly  
showed by Public records that these  
charges were more to be made  
against the Liberals themselves.  
The poll tax was taken off in ac-  
cordance to the promise of the  
Government. Revenues were law and the  
Government thought that those  
who used the roads mainly should  
pay for their upkeep so the Gasol-  
ine tax was instituted. Continuing  
he showed the difference between  
the poor roads of the late adminis-  
tration and the high quality of the  
present government.

It is the policy of the present  
Government to assist in coopera-  
tion with the farmers. It has fol-  
lowed that policy during the past  
four years and he was pleased to  
see that the policy followed out  
was approved of by the Patriot,  
an editorial of Jan 21, expressing  
itself to that effect. The Govern-  
ment has assisted in the Bent  
Grass industry and saved the  
farmers of the Island in Poll Tax,  
\$80,000 during the last three years.  
He refuted the statement that  
the Disease Free Area was accom-  
plished solely by the Dominion Gov-  
ernment but stated that it cost  
the Government \$8000.

The educational policy of the  
present government is diametrically  
opposed to that of the late  
Government who were farther be-  
hind in their assistance in this re-  
gard than the Conservatives.

After a review of financial con-  
ditions under the two Governments  
he stated that the favorable Bud-  
get brought down was due to the  
splendid presentation and recogni-  
tion of the Provincial claims.

Mr. Blanchard followed Mr. Mc-  
Lean. After criticizing a statement  
of Mr. McLean, he stated that he  
could see no cause for eulogy of  
the present Government as they  
have done nothing more than the  
Bell Government except spend more  
money. Every department of the  
public service was found to have  
improved during the last four years  
severely scored the Hon. Mr. Logan  
of the Conservative Government  
mentioned the Minister of Public  
Works on the wonderful review of  
his department, and stated he  
(Mr. McPhee) followed the road policy  
of the Liberals.

A great deal has been said why  
the Bell Government did not press  
the Provincial claims. There were  
severely scored the system prac-  
ticed by the Conservative Govern-  
ment in Ottawa. I am willing to  
believe that the Leader of the Gov-  
ernment did his best when the op-

On motion of Mr. Saunders a  
bill for an act to incorporate the  
Temperance Alliance of Prince Ed-  
ward Islands was read a second  
time and committed. Mr. McNevin  
in the chair. Progress was reported.

During the consideration of the  
bill the Honorable Premier Stewart  
took objection to section C of  
clause 1, setting for one of the pur-  
poses of the Alliance and which  
read as follows:—"To secure recog-  
nition of the right and duty of  
every citizen to observe and as-  
sist in the enforcement of law."  
The Honorable Premier wanted to  
know what the section meant.  
Does that mean to instigate, he  
said, that the people of this Pro-  
vince, in fact of the whole British  
Empire do not enjoy the right to  
observe and assist in the enforce-  
ment of law. The clause is ridicu-  
lous and a serious reflection upon  
every citizen.

The word "assist" was accord-  
ingly changed to "advance".

Mr. Tanton contended that  
"Temperance Alliance" was not a  
proper name. It is not a temper-  
ance Alliance but a "Prohibition  
Alliance" and he suggested that  
"Prohibition" be inserted in lieu of  
"Temperance."

To Mr. McLure asking if the  
Alliance had any capital stock, he  
was told it had none.

The Honorable Premier said that  
since the purpose of the Alliance  
was moral and not commercial it  
should have no commercial privi-  
leges, consequently clause 6 which  
read as follows was struck out.

"No individual member of the  
said corporation shall be liable for  
the payment of any debt contract-  
ed by the said corporation beyond  
the amount of any subscription to  
the said corporation due and un-  
paid by the individual member. The  
bill was agreed to with amend-  
ments.

On motion of Honorable Mr. Ste-  
wart a bill for an act to amend the  
Land Assessment act, 1924, was  
read a second time and committed.  
Mr. Buntain in the chair. The  
bill was agreed to without amend-  
ment.

By what process of reason-  
ing can they tell their law is  
going to be carried out better than  
Prohibition? We can't depend  
upon the money placed to put the  
law in force. That is one of the  
reasons why Prohibition has not  
been effective. No government  
in the world ever has been able to  
pass a satisfactory Prohibition law,  
he declared. Take the question  
of smuggling. Not only liquor is  
smuggled, many other things are  
smuggled.

Concluding he stated that he did  
not propose coming out for election  
but in the cause of prohibition he  
changed his mind. Should the Con-  
servative Government gain power  
and should the new Temperance  
law be enforced, he hoped that the  
revenue be largely used for the or-  
phanages and the poor.

Mr. Blanchard moved an amend-  
ment seconded by Mr. Saunders, to  
the resolution that the House go  
into supply.

The Honorable the Premier asked  
if he might read the amend-  
ment and having done so declared  
that it was not a proper amend-  
ment; it was not in order but an  
attempt to delay the motion. The  
Mr. Saunders proceeded to quote  
from authorities that the amend-  
ment was in order. The Honora-  
ble the Premier saw that the re-  
ferences quoted were relative to  
Finance, the amendment was not  
Premier Stewart had stated that  
the general rule is that the  
amendment must have relevance to  
the resolution. This is a matter to  
suspend the motion to go into sup-  
ply, for the purpose of tendering  
a vote of thanks. The precedents  
quoted do not bear on the matter.  
Mr. Saunders in reply claimed, that  
such an amendment was passed in  
New Brunswick a short time ago;  
moreover the authorities do not  
say that it is confined to finance.  
He thought it his right to have the  
rule submitted to him.

The Honorable the Speaker, said  
he could have the rule in the morn-  
ing and the debate would be con-  
tinued with.

Hon. Mr. McEwen in discussing  
the debate said he did not propose  
taking up much of the time of the  
House. He listened with great  
pleasure to the splendid speeches  
delivered in the House, especially  
on his side of the House. They  
were clear, logical and conclusive  
and dealt thoroughly with the  
questions on hand. The talk on  
the opposition is largely abuse.  
This is the custom of the Opposi-  
tion. They should give some con-  
structive suggestions. Have you  
received one suggestion Mr. Speak-  
er, from the other side of the  
House, he asked. Perhaps the  
Government are conducting so suc-  
cessfully they have no room for  
suggestions. I think, he said,  
something should be done concern-  
ing the cost of gas power. Why  
couldn't they suggest something.  
We are open to suggestions.

Continuing Hon. Mr. Mc-  
Ewen capably answered ob-  
jections put forth by Mr.  
Blanchard and in regard to the  
statement made by the Leader of  
the Opposition that the Govern-  
ment dismissed fifty officials,  
where they came from unless  
they were appointed by the Lib-  
erals.

Mr. Saunders also stated, he said,  
in regard to the trip South that Mr.  
Logan could give more information  
in one hour or one night than I  
could give in ten years. I give  
this challenge to Mr. Saunders that  
he can appoint one man I will ap-  
point another and if they don't find  
twice as much in my report as in  
Mr. Logan's I will give \$500 to each  
of the hospitals. I did not look  
for that trip South and I wouldn't  
take it again for \$2,000 because it  
is worth more. Moreover Mr.  
Logan's trip cost nine times more  
than mine. Continuing he claimed  
the eastern group of the West India  
Islands are not worth bothering  
with. In regard to the western  
group it would take millions of dol-  
lars to compete with the people  
down there. Practically the whole  
advantage of the West Indies  
Treaty is with the West Indies.

Mr. Robb, Minister of Finance  
did more for Canada and Prince  
Edward Island in his treaty with  
Cuba than Mr. Logan did with the  
whole group. It is worth some-  
thing for us here to know there is  
nothing worth while to us in the  
West Indies, said Hon. Mr. Mc-  
Ewen.

For twenty years from 1891-1911  
the Liberal had deficits each year.  
When the Conservatives came in  
power, the Island began to prosper  
in 1919 the greatest deception ever  
practiced by a government on a  
people was then practiced. They  
put on a poll tax. Taxed the peo-  
ple, and went in in this high hand-  
ed way until 1923 when they were  
turned out.

In regard to delegations under  
Liberal rule 16,000 was spent of

bit of hypocrites. To strike out the  
root of the trouble you must pro-  
hibit the importation of liquor. He  
at Ottawa they want the revenue

Some say give us a plebiscite  
You have a plebiscite at the next  
election. We always put our card  
on the table. We use no camo-  
flage, said Hon. Mr. McEwen. He  
could not understand how the O-  
pposition could hold up their hand  
and face the people of the Pro-  
vince. The record of the present go-  
vernment is one to be proud of. We  
made it disease free Country 1  
us make it a tax free country.  
The young people knew the wrong  
things elsewhere they would hes-  
itate before leaving. There is a  
place in the continent of Nor-  
America like Prince Edward Island  
should turn up in its development.

Mr. J. B. McDonald the ne-  
cessary speaker said it was not neces-  
sary for him to go into any great  
length the financial conditions  
the Province unless to remark that  
it has greatly improved since four  
years ago.

When we took over the Govern-  
ment in 1923, he said, we were  
faced to face with a serious state  
affairs—our revenue exhausted, our  
sinking fund depleted and the re-  
sult in a very bad state of affairs. We  
had to contend with the \$30.0  
that this Province was getting from  
the Federal for arctic purposes  
which was withdrawn  
the secondary roads and bridge  
were also in a deplorable condi-  
tion. The right was not encourag-  
ed. Our Premier and today's condi-  
tion are in a most satisfactory  
state. In speaking of the roads, Mr.  
McDonald said he was very mu-  
ch amused listening to the Honora-  
ble gentleman from O'Leary trying  
find fault with the patrol system  
on the roads. He admitted that  
perhaps in some section the rig-  
ht was not on the job but on t-  
whole the department had recom-  
mended for the splendid effort  
they made to keep the roads  
good repair.

He was sorry to say that what  
all the other industries, such  
potato growing, dairying, egg c-  
cles and many branches of ag-  
culture have received quite a lot  
assistance and encouragement from  
the Government, the fisheries has  
been neglected. That is a matter  
of the Federal Govt. but he was  
glad to say that it is the intenti-  
of the local Government to take  
matter up and see if something can  
be done to give the fishermen  
broader knowledge of the fishery  
and the most profitable way  
carry on that business.

In reference to poll tax it  
Government, he said, did away with  
it because it was unjust. The far-  
mers were paying the greater por-  
tion of this tax. The necessity  
keeping up the patrol system ma-  
the introduction of the Gasol-  
ine Tax which is considered by  
people as a fair one.

In coming to the question of  
Temperance Law, Mr. McDonald  
declared that there have been  
many changes in that law for  
past 25 years. It has been given  
fair trial but the time has cor-  
when a change has become nec-  
essary. He expressed the opinion that  
the Honorable Premier has taken  
the right course in announcing  
attitude in regard to this ques-  
and is prepared to make a chan-  
which we trust and know, he sa-  
has for its object, a better a  
more workable Temperance law.  
Mr. Hunter arose and adjourn  
the debate. House meets to-
