PREACHED ON P. E. I.—The Rev. S. H. Rice, of Sunny Brae, (Montreal), supernumerary Minister of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference, passed away about 12 o'clock Tuesday night of heart failure, following an attack of the grippe. Mr. Rice, though suffering the last few days from the prevalent epidemic, was able to be about the house as usual yesterday and his death will come as a great shock to the whole community, in which he was held in the highest esteem. The deceased, who was 71 years of age, came to Prince Edward Island from Ontario in 1883, and was for a time pastor of Grace Church in Charlottetown. His other pastorate were: Newcastle, Fairville, St. Andrews, and Milltown, N. B.; Cornwall, Souris and Vernon River, P. E. I. While on the latter circuit his health failed in 1905 and he had since resided at Sunny Brae. He leaves a widow, formerly Miss Pollard, of Bowmanville, Ontario, and two sons, Rev. H. C. Rice, Pastor of the Methodist Church at Sussex, and Rev. J. M. Rice, Pastor of the Methodist Church at Summerside; also three daughters, Isabel G. wife of Rev. A. S. Rogers, Pastor of Graton street Methodist Church, Halifax; Catherine L., wife of Rev. S. Irving, of Cayley, Alberta, and Helen P., training as a nurse in the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. Another son, Rev. C. Herbert, predeceased his father some twenty years ago in the first year of his ministry.

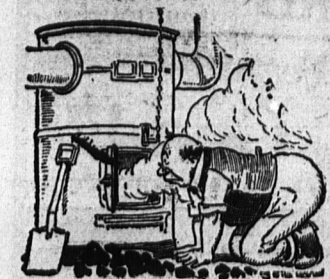

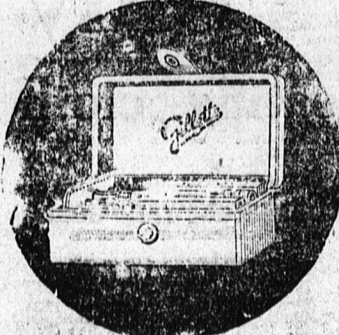

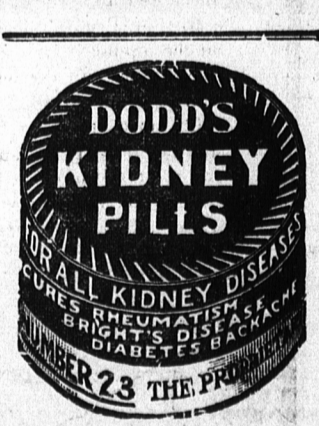

At the Post Office it was recalled by officials that letters addressed to that name at Fredericton, P. E. I., had been mis-sent here by mistake on a number of occasions, and that made it evident that the wounded man is a Prince Edward Islander. Later advice from Ottawa stated that he was formerly a member of the 17th Battalion, which was raised here for the first Canadian Contingent.
