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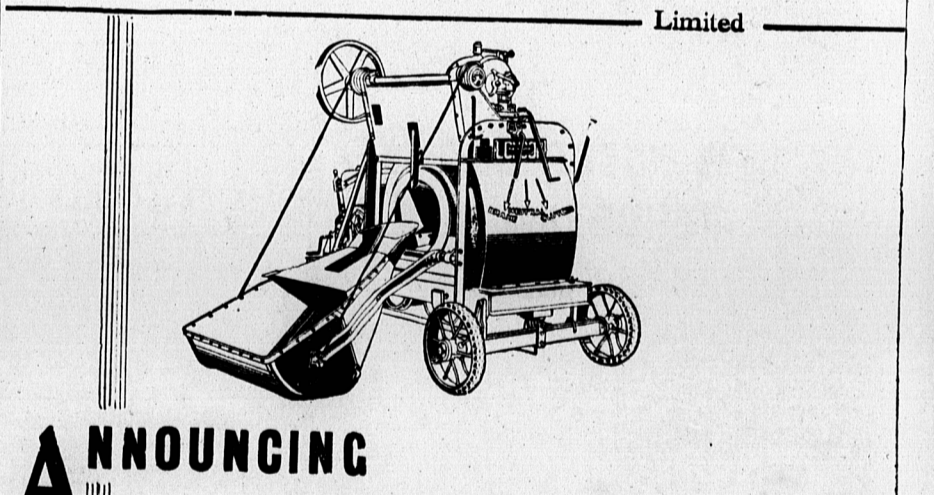

Florence Nightingale and the Red Cross The relationship between Florence Nightingale and the Red Cross was three-fold. She inspired Dunant through whose efforts the Red Cross Convention of Geneva came into existence; she devoted her life to the relief of suffering, and she foresaw the need of an educated public opinion for the prevention of disease and the improvement of health. Thus she personified in advance the Red Cross organization as it exists throughout the civilized world today. It is, therefore, most appropriate that the birthday of this famous Englishwoman should be commemorated as "British Empire Red Cross day."

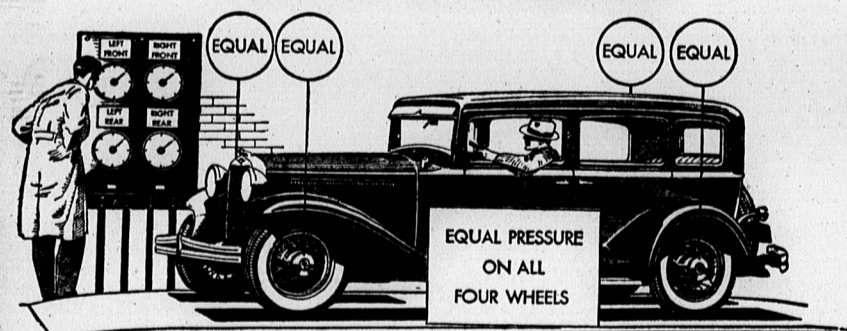
