APPLE PIE TASTES GOOD TO ISLAND SOLDIERS

The following letter has been received by John Howlett, Amnandale from his son Roy of the 2nd Canadian Heavy Battery now in Bonn Germany. Bonn, Jan. 10th 1919.

Dear Father, As it is sometime since I have written you I am sending a few lines along with a map of the Rhine Land and River Rhine. You will notice "Bonn" ten minutes car-ride from our billets which are at Kessenach also marked. I live about one hundred yards from the church. I was in "Cologne" yesterday or Koln as the Germans spell it. It is a large town as you will see by the map. The principal attraction is the Cathedral one of the finest in the world. One of the priests who could speak a little English took me all through the building consequently I saw many interesting things in parts of the building where spectators as a rule are not admitted. I was on guard a few days ago and a very well dressed lady came up and spoke to me in perfect English. A valuable Red Cross dog belonging to her had been stolen a few hours previous and she asked my assistance in finding him, she gave me a full description of "Haska" as his name was and to make a long story short I returned the dog to her inside two hours but that is not all for she invited me to the house for a piece of pie I went of course and she gave me a whole apple pie, plate and all as I told her it was the best I tasted since I left home. Her name is Mrs. Muller, she lived eighteen years in New York and has a beautiful summer residence there. They are very wealthy, she was a voluntary Red Cross worker during the war and was Matron of the Bonn Red Cross Hospital. Her husband is a German. I have not met him yet as he was in Cologne, on business when I called. She has invited me back again for a special potato salad she is going to make for me, it is a regular home. I have the privilege of taking the loan of books from her English Library. It is nice to meet

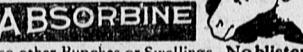
