Mr. Jill Prevost of East Bideford in Prince County, an elderly man of about 85 years of age, was found dead on the road about a half mile from his home about eleven o'clock yesterday morning. He had left home about eight o'clock with a truck wagon load of wood and it is believed that he fell or was thrown from the wagon. Neighbors noticed the horse unattended on the road and followed the tracks back to where the body lay. Evidence indicated that it had been dragged for about fifty yards. Members of Summerside detachment R. C. M. P. and the Coroner Dr. Austin Delaney were called and on examination he was found to have a fractured skull and fractured jaw bone. The Coroner decided that an inquest was not necessary.

Last evening at an enthusiastic and largely attended meeting in the Charlottetown Armories the 1947-48 Badminton season was officially opened when the annual meeting of the Charlottetown Garrison Badminton Club was held. The possibility of marketing two million bushels of Prince Edward Island seed potatoes in North Africa this fall was pictured by Premier Jones in an address last night. The Premier cited an inquiry he had received in this connection from Algeria. Before attempting negotiations, he said, was the lack of Canadian currency in North Africa. Should an agreement be reached it would mean about three million dollars to the farmers of this Province.

A store owned by Mr. Harry McLaughlin, Starbuck Corner, was completely destroyed by fire about 5:30 P.M. yesterday. The fire, which began in an adjoining warehouse, from an unknown source, was discovered when Mr. McLaughlin went into the warehouse with some goods, and found it full of smoke. The building could be summoned, the building was ablaze. A pumper was brought in from an adjoining community, but only succeeded in preventing the fire from spreading to a nearby garage.

The Bergman Construction Co., Montague, has acquired a new pile pumper this month. Although it is only in the experimental stages, the company hopes that this new machine will speed up production considerably. The machine is compact, operated by an attached motor, and is designed to drive a shaft to which is attached a drum on which iron chains are connected. As the drum revolves, the chains fly out owing to centrifugal force striking the back of the pile groups. The machine has already been in operation experimentally, but as yet no definite decision has been made on its efficiency. The company has expressed, however, that in addition will increase considerably the out-put of pile-piers.

HISTORIC P. E. I. CEMETERY AND ITS MONUMENTS

Detailed List of Stones and Inscriptions in Old Protestant Cemetery, Elm Avenue, Charlottetown, of Interest to Islanders at Home and Abroad.

Note of Explanation: In order to facilitate the finding of stones or monuments, they have been listed in "rows", and each has been given a number. The "rows" are by no means always straight and there are many gaps between stones. All rows run from left to right, as one faces Elm Ave. The stones on the left-hand side of the cemetery are listed first, the first row being the one nearest to Elm Ave. In the case of each stone or memorial there is a note of its type (slab, upright, flat stone, shaft, sarcophagus, etc.) and its physical condition. All stones that are intact, in no need of repairs or leveling, and with good clear lettering are marked "S". Stones with faded lettering but otherwise in good condition are marked "I", followed by the letters "IF" (lettering faint), "IV" (lettering very faint), or some other comment as to lettering. Family names only are written in capital letters.

Row Stone No. Names, Dates, Inscriptions, etc. Condition of Stone & Type

- 1 (Near gate, close to walk)—Wm. and Ellen Henderson (no other lettering)—Small shaft, roughly cemented on base.
2 G. Wallace, son of George and Jeholiah WAYNE 1859-1872.—Footstone II.
3 Jane, daughter of John and Amy WAYE, 1848-1880.—Slab—I, faint.
4 Mary, and a little Mary—Slab—I—almost gone.
