DEFEND THE EMPIRE BY ACTS OF PEACE.

Sir Wilfred Laurier Speaks at the National Liberal Club Banquet.

From the London Times.

The National Liberal Club, Whitehall gave a dinner on July 14 in honor of the Colonial Premiers. Among those present were Lord Strathcona and Sir Wilfred Laurier.

Sir William Harcourt, in proposing the health of the Colonial Premiers, said they had amongst them that day a statesman with all the graceful fervour of the race to which he belongs. (Cheers.) What was Canada of today? He was old enough to remember what Canada was. It was a remarkable fact that the Coronation year of Queen Victoria was darkened by the gloom of a Canadian rebellion. It was a singular fact that the Coronation of Edward VII would be gladdened by the presence of Sir Wilfred Laurier. (Cheers.) He could remember himself as a boy seeing the Guards embark for the suppression of the Canadian rebellion, and he was sitting to-day by the representative—a most brilliant representative of one of the most distinguished and greatest and oldest of our Dominions. (Cheers.) Well they are not admitted to the secrets of the conference—(laughter)—the conference which had, he was sorry to say, for the moment been interrupted by an unfortunate accident while they all hoped that Mr. Chamberlain might soon be restored to perform a duty which, he believed, would be to the advantage for the Empire. (Cheers.) In a speech at the Constitutional Club, referring to the Empire. Sir Wilfred Laurier said:—"Perhaps there are some, perhaps there are many, who believe that the British Empire must be maintained by war measures. For my part I believe that it can be well defended by the acts of peace. (Cheers.) My conviction is that what it has gained the British Em-

pire shall keep, and it is not so much by cultivating the arts in which England has undoubted supremacy that it shall be maintained. I am a believer in those old doctrines that have made England great, and it is a firm conviction of my heart that it will make them greater." (Cheers.) If that was approved by the Constitutional Club, he was sure it would be received with acclamation by the assembly in which they were met. (Cheers.)

Sir Wilfred Laurier, who on rising to reply for the Dominion of Canada was received with loud cheers, said that they endeavoured to carry on Parliamentary Government in the Colonies very much after the manner of that of the Mother of all Parliaments. In his opinion, there was no reform which was so beneficial as the reform which gave the Colonies the right to govern themselves—(hear, hear)—but if the Colonies had continued to be administered from London the result might have been most unfortunate. Personally he should have thought it a great blessing to the British Empire if it had been possible for the Empire to unite in a great commercial policy, but he doubted if it could be done. There were too many divergences of interests at stake, but if a universal system of Free Trade had been possible he believed it would have conducted to the good of the Empire and the civilization of mankind. (Cheers.) He did not ask them to put burden on themselves, or depart from principles of their policy, but he asked them to consider whether or no it was possible within the limits of present legislation to renew the Treaty which was made by Mr. Cobden with France and start on a new principle which might start something between the great Mother Land and the Colonies. (Cheers.)

BRITISH COTTON

SPINNERS SUGGESTION.

LONDON, July 29.—At a meeting held in Manchester to-day of the Master Cotton Spinners Federation, it was resolved to issue another circular urging the adoption of short time as a means of ameliorating the cotton situation.

GERMAN NAVAL AFFAIRS.

BERLIN, July 29.—The German gunboat Panther sailed for the Caribbean Sea to-day. The German cruiser Gazelle, which was first ordered temporarily to the Caribbean, has now been permanently attached to the American Station.

TOO MUCH KISSING ON

THE NEW YORK CENTRAL.

ROCHESTER, N. Y. July 29.—Officials of the New York Central Railroad are now considering the advisability of issuing orders prohibiting all kissing in train sheds or stations or on car platforms. The Central officers recently ordered that all kissing be prohibited in the train sheds of their road, and now the ban on kissing is to be promulgated.

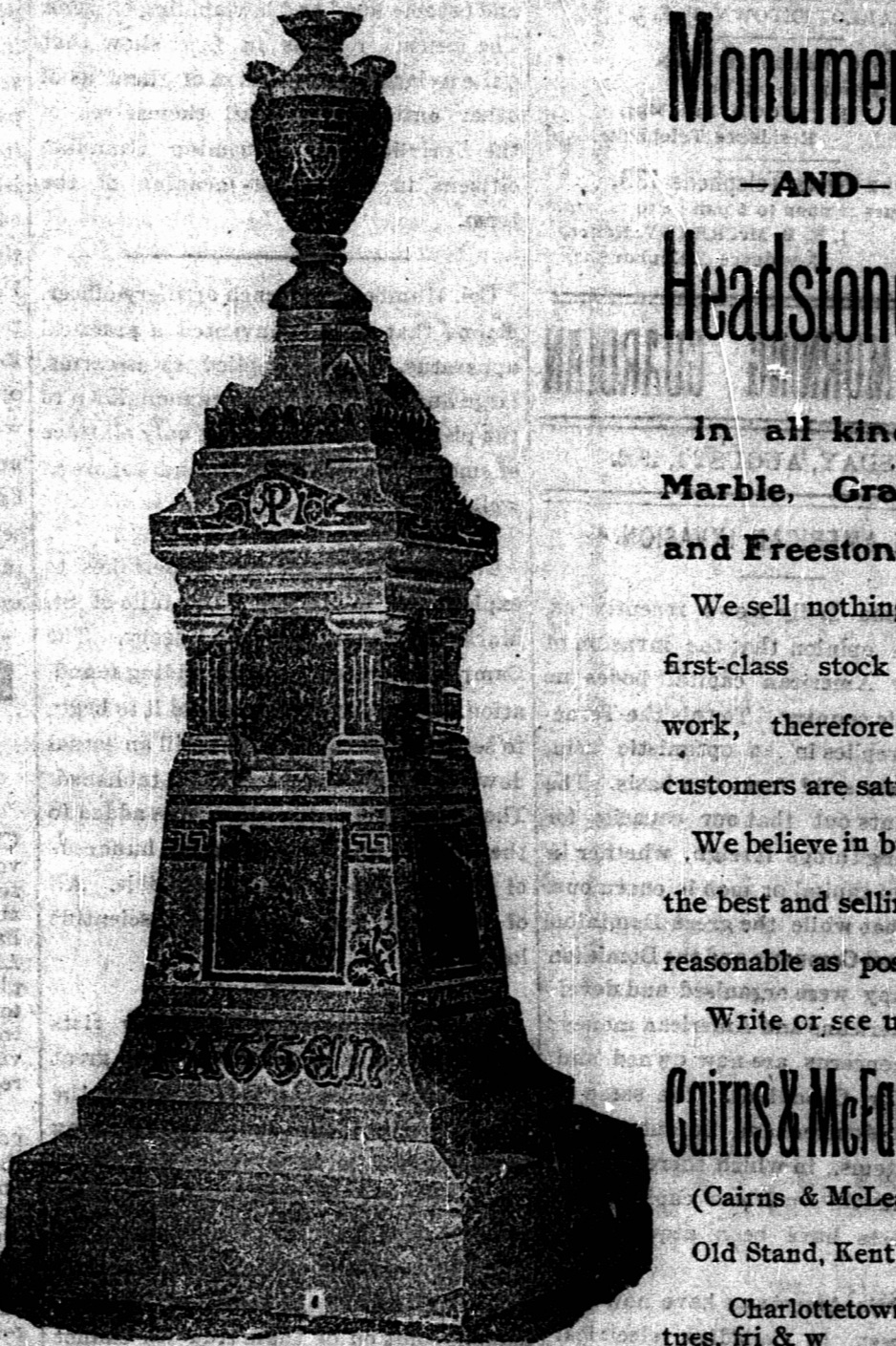
