DIFFICULTIES IN MARKETING FRUIT

A McNeill, Chief of the Fruit Division, Ottawa, Writes Regarding the Work on the Island.

The following letter which the President of the Fruit Growers' Association deems proper to give to the public in the interests of our apple producers, explains itself.

REVEREND FATHER BURKE, ALBERTON, P. E. I.

DEAR FATHER BURKE:

I have just received a letter from Inspector Burke speaking in the highest terms of the success of your Fall Exhibition in fruit. He said it was the largest and best exhibit of fruit he had ever seen. I congratulate you and anticipate that Prince Edward Island will rapidly take its proper place as an apple growing district.

Mr. Burke said that the difficulty was now in the marketing. I hesitate to give any suggestions or advice with reference to the future in markets; nevertheless, I feel in honor bound to give you the benefit of the best that is in me on this question even supposing it should turn out later that I have been mistaken. It is my opinion that good winter stock will sell almost, if not quite, as well next January, February and March as it did last year, in which case very good prices may be expected. It would seem to me, therefore, that the proper thing for Prince Edward growers, having particularly long keeping stock, would be to hold their apples and ship in January and February. This may not be convenient but it certainly looks to me as if it should be the policy not only for this year but for all time to come. Therefore, the sooner you make the experiment the better.

It may be remarked that it is somewhat risky in our circumstances to ship fruit in January or February—at least until some better accommodation by train and boat to the mainland and Halifax is afforded. This however will be forthcoming.

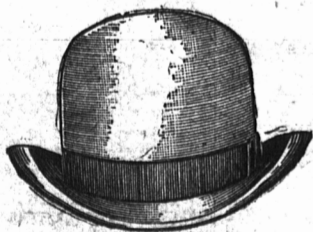
