SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

District—Six months residence upon a farm of at least one acre, or in each of three years. A homesteader may live with nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least one acre, or in each of three years. A homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.

District—Just reside upon the homestead or pre-empt six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to clear homestead portion) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights and cannot obtain pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. District—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

MONDAY.

The whole community of St. Mary's Road and in fact the whole province has been stirred to a feeling of deep sympathy as a result of the tragedy which has befallen the family of Patrick and Mrs. McGee, who reside at the aforementioned place, about six miles from Montague.

In two days the parents were bereft of five of their six children. The deceased children are: Louis, aged 15; Benzie, aged 12; George, aged 8; Bridget, aged 6; and Thomas, aged 5.

The death of the children and the illness of the fifth are supposed to be due to ptomaine poisoning, brought on by eating heartily of decayed herring, which, on Thursday, Mr. and Mrs. McGee, and five children, partook freely at dinner. The sixth child was not at home for dinner.

After dinner the children and the mother became ill and as their condition gradually became more serious Dr. Fraser of Montague was sent for. He arrived at the house at 4 a. m. Friday. He found all five children very sick and one of the boys in a hopeless condition. The sick ones were complaining of pains in the head and stomach and they vomited green matter. There was no movement of the bowels, and this fact seemed to the doctor to be peculiar. In view of the other symptoms, the heart action was very weak, and he had to administer toxins. He worked with them, for some hours applying every remedy he thought might be beneficial. One of the children died at 5 a. m., an hour after the doctor arrived. In the evening he left for Montague and about 7 o'clock on his return home he met Dr. McInyre on his way out to that part of the country on his usual call. He informed Dr. McInyre of the circumstances, and the latter called at the house on his way out. On returning from his other calls in that neighborhood he paid a second visit, and learned that two of the other children had died about 10 o'clock within fifteen minutes of each other.

Saturday morning between 9 and 10 o'clock the fourth child passed away.

The father and mother are all right. The latter did not complain of feeling ill, but his wife vomited twice.

Mr. McGee is a hard-working farmer about 40 years of age and he and his wife are having the sympathy of the community in their fearful bereavement.

Dr. Allan of Cardigan, coroner and Dr. McMillan of Charlottetown, Provincial Health Officer arrived at Montague by rail on Saturday evening and, accompanied by Dr. Fraser of Montague, Ruben McDonald, Charlottetown, and Martin McKinnon of the Guardian, Montague, drove about six miles to the McGee home at St. Mary's Road, where the remains of

his five children were lying side by side.

After a glance at the situation the coroner proceeded with the inquest, by empanelling the following jury: Michael Gormley, Foreman; Bernard McLaughlin, Thos. Murphy, Patrick Jernally, James McCarthy, Thos. Hughes and James Gormley, all of who were duly sworn in.

The first witness was Patk. McGee, father of the dead children. His evidence was of a general character. He was a laborer and only was home two weeks in \$11 for six months.

He had taken dinner with his family on Thursday last and left immediately for his home at a lobster factory at Sturgeons Bay.

He arrived home on Friday to find three of his children dead and two dangerously ill.

Mrs. McGee, mother of the children was the next witness. She related in detail the affair of the household and that on January 8th and 17th last two children aged one and three years, died of years, died of whooping cough and pneumonia. The father was not home at the time.

She also described the dinner on Thursday fish, bread, tea etc. The children all played in the field and about the house until dusk when they when they had supper. One girl then not feeling hearty, ate nothing but was not particularly ill.

They all began to complain shortly after 8 p. m. Thursday. The first one died about 8 a. m. Friday morning and the fifth about 8 a. m. Saturday.

The other witnesses were Ambrose Cassidy, uncle of the children, Dr. Roy Fraser and Robt. McCarron.

The verdict of the jury appointed by Coroner Dr. Allan was as follows:

That after viewing the bodies and hearing the evidence of the witnesses we believe death to be due to some form of poisoning and recommend that a post mortem examination be held and analysis made of the stomach contents to try and find the cause of said poisoning."

The post mortem revealed a like condition in both cases examined, strongly indicating poison but required a chemical examination to declare positively the nature of the poisoning.

The brains, intestines and stomach were removed for examination.

Fertilizer Needs of Certain Crops

Some people may contend that, where a large supply of farm manure is available, it is unnecessary to apply artificial fertilizers, but this argument doesn't always apply.
