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At Rotary

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rotarian T. B. Grady who gave an interesting description of a six day's motor trip from St. Petersburg to Florida along the west coast of the Gulf of Mexico, the eastern coast of the Atlantic and return.

He made mention of Tampa, one of the most important cigar manufacturing centres in America, Bradenton, Sarasota, Venice, (a city which had been abandoned after \$21,000,000 had been spent in its development but which is expected to be restored again); Fort Myers, the City of Palms, and the winter residence of Edison and Ford, Naples on the Gulf of Mexico, Miami, The Everglades, and other points of interest visited on this delightful trip.

The Everglades proper extends for thirty-five miles and is really a tremendous mango swamp full of stumps, decayed brush, slush, etc., resting to a depth of eighteen feet on a formation of coral rock. It abounds in alligators, snakes, birds of all kinds.

For ninety miles along the Miami trail there are no inhabitants except Indians and this territory is leased by the United States Patrol who have stations ten miles apart. The town of Everglades was built up on sand pumped from the swamp. The Barren river runs through the city. The banks of this river are only about a foot high and it is possible to step from the sidewalk right into one of the many pleasure boats and yachts which are sailing on this river.

Mr. Grady then described the road which was built ten years ago through this swampy section of the country at a cost of five million dollars. A trench or canal about 20 to 25 feet wide was excavated through the coral rock in order to provide drainage and the blasted rock was used as material for building the road.

In conclusion he described a number of the chief features of Miami. President Hornby presided at the club and the guests were Rotarian Father William Bowlen of High River, Alta., who is at present visiting his mother. Mrs. Michael Bowlen at Avondale, Rotarian Al-Jah Smith of Montreal, and Rotarian Thomas of Chelsea, Mass.

The musical program included a vocal solo by Rotarian C. J. Gallagher, who was encored.

Mr. Walter Grant in person acknowledged the flowers sent to him by the Rotary Club when he was a patient in the Royal Victoria Hospital Montreal.

MONTREAL, July 13. (By the Canadian Press)—The night clerk of one of Montreal's leading hotels, perspiring at his desk during the recent record breaking heat wave, got a call from a room on the top floor.

"I must have more heat," said the voice of the caller.

"Oh yeah?" replied the clerk, thinking somebody was trying to get funny with the heat. He hung up.

The call persisted and the clerk investigated. He opened the door of the complainants room and was greeted with a howl—"close that door—do you want to freeze me?"

"Shades of Sam McGee" thought the clerk but he did as he was ordered.

"Get me more blankets!" ordered the man who was Jean Masson, fresh from 20 years in Equatorial French Africa. Temperatures of 130 degrees were his usual fare in that country, Masson said, and Montreal during the heat wave was unpleasantly chilly for him.

"I have not been warm since I left Africa," Masson said, as he snuggled down under a fresh supply of blankets. He was enroute to visit a brother in Alberta.

WOMEN IN FOREIGN LEGION?

PARIS, July 13.—(British United Press)—The presence of a woman in the French Foreign Legion is strongly suspected. According to a notice from the Legion headquarters, a close watch is to be kept on all soldiers at a forthcoming bathing parade.
