

The Guardian regrets to learn that Mrs. S. F. Tarbush's mother was obliged to be again removed to the P. E. I. Hospital for the third amputation. Two years ago the right foot was amputated, soon after the limb had to be amputated above the knee now the other foot must come off, a terrible ordeal for a lady over seventy.

Rev. J. P. Floyd preached a powerful sermon Sunday evening in the Central Christian Church on the Doctrine of the Holy Spirit, taking for his text, John 16, 8-9. Mr. Floyd announced that he would begin a series of special Evangelistic meetings beginning next Lord's Day and continuing for several weeks. Mrs. J. S. Floyd of St. John will sing each evening.

Last Thursday the fishermen of Rustico and Cavendish held a very large and representative meeting in the boat house of Kenneth Pineau, Rustico. Citizens will be surprised to learn of the death of Francis Hyde, Chestnut Street, City, which took place Sunday at his late residence. The late Mr. Hyde was an estimable citizen and for the past few years has been an attendant at Falcenwood, where he discharged his duties in a faithful and competent manner. He was a native of Cornwall, P. E. I. He was a member of St. James Church and leaves to mourn their loss a widow and one son Harry. The funeral notice will be found elsewhere in this issue.

George Byron Currie arrived at his home at Dundas from Bonanza a few days ago on a visit to his parents. His life has been full of adventure and travel. He entered the U. S. Navy and was Corporal Sergeant and First Sergeant of the Cruiser Baltimore. With his five years enlistment, after an honorable discharge from the Brooklyn Navy yard, he left for San Francisco as Baggage Master. He left there for the Serenas where he remained for some time. After a year of travel he returned to British Columbia where he remained for some time, and in the month of February of the severe winter of 1898 left for the Klondyke. He was one of the few among hundreds who performed that arduous task. An account of the severeness of the winter was copied all over the North American press, and kept back many from going and losing their all. After a few years in the Klondyke, when the Boer war was then raging, and when the disaster at Majorsfontein overtook the highlanders Mr. Currie offered the war office a small contingent to help fill up the gap in the Black Watch, but was respectfully declined "for the present" with the thanks of the war office. As an expert miner he commanded big pay, and afterwards worked in his own mine on Granville with Logan & Edwards, as partners. He is a member of the Fraternity of Eagles, also of the Odd Fellows, and President of the Liberal Association of the Yukon.
