"TEMPERATE BEER."

All prohibitory laws come in contact with more or less so-called "temperate beer," an artful compound intended to avoid the penalty of the law on the one hand and yet furnish to the purchaser a sufficient stimulus under which he will "seek it yet again." The vendor has no scruples in declaring the beverage to be non-intoxicating and while the knowing ones among his customers are well aware of its nature, the new beginners in tipping may possibly be in some cases deceived. The other day Inspector Jenkin's procured a sample of this "temperate beer" from a saloon on Queen Street for the purpose of having it analysed.

The Guardian has been shown the analyst's report on the sample, certifying that it contained by weight 4.90 per cent of alcohol and by volume 3.90 per cent. As either of these tests considerably exceeds the limit set by law, the so-called "temperate beer" is in the eye of the law an intoxicating drink. And this raises a question as to the testimony respecting this class of drinks when it comes up on a charge of illegally selling intoxicating liquor. A good deal of this sort of drink has been imbibed from time to time and not a few persons have stated on their oath that they believe it to be non-intoxicating, or that it had no intoxicating effect upon them.

What is the value of this testimony and how far should it operate as a defence for the seller? There are many habitual drinkers who would perhaps swear that a glass of whiskey swallowed by the purchaser, had no intoxicating effect, but if it were proven to be whiskey the well-known intoxicating nature of that drink would still sufficiently establish the offence and conviction would follow. In the case of beer the testimony of the drinker that he felt no intoxicating effect, it would seem ought not to be taken as conclusive evidence of its harmless quality. Much of the beer sold as a so-called temperance drink would if analysed come within the class which the law includes as intoxicating. The attention of those giving testimony in prohibition cases is directed to this matter. In too many cases we fear the beer is strong enough to be intoxicating and the testimony which affirms it to be not intoxicating is strong enough to constitute something very like perjury.

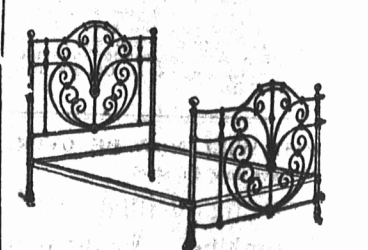
