How Gouin Dictated To MacKenzie King

When the New Premier Failed to Negotiate a Deal Mr. Crerar Sir Lomer Gouin Stepped in and Demanded His Full Pound of Flesh Making the Cabinet An Old Gang Institution.

(Special To The Guardian.) OTTAWA, December 28.—"Thought that he was King and I shall be over him," was the message of Sir Lomer Gouin to Mr. King when he presented the Cabinet slate today to the Liberal leader.
