He was a brother of the Inspector of Hulls and a member of a well known St. John family.

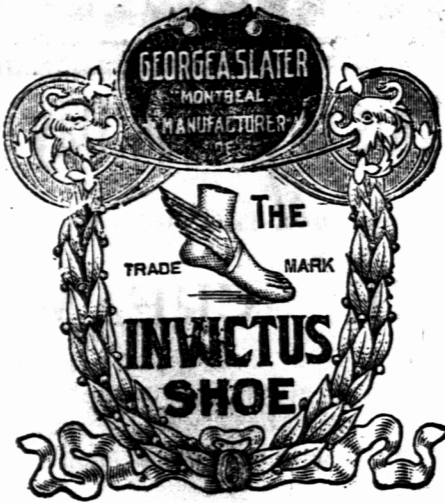

FROM THE FAR NORTH

Peary Has Reached 83:50 North.

BLOCKED BY THE ICE

Will Winter There and Try Again—His Wife Returned Home.

NEWS FROM LIEUT. PEARY. NORTH SYDNEY, Sept. 13.—(Special).—The Peary arctic steamer Erie has arrived here from Cape Sabine, Ellesmere land, all well.

BLOCKED BY THE ICE. The expedition got to 83:50 North and was then blocked by ice and open sea that was impassable either for boats or sleighs WHERE HE WILL WINTER.

Lieut. Peary winters at Cape Sabine and expects to push forward next spring. Mrs. and Miss Peary returned on the Erie.

RESULTS OF THE EXPEDITION. Peary says the results of his work so far are rounding the northern limit of the Greenland Archipelago, reaching the highest latitude yet attained in the western hemisphere and the determination of the origin of the so-called polar crystalline flow of bergs.

LAST SAD SCENES AT THE BEDSIDE

The Grief-Stricken Wife and Brother Waiting the Death Angel's Coming

CABINET MEMBERS SAY THEIR LAST GOOD-BYE

After Praying His Physicians to let Him Die the President Passes to Unconsciousness—His Pulse Ceases to Beat and Realise That He is in the Hour and Article of Death—The Assassin, Guarded From Violence, Admits That he Must Suffer the Extreme Penalty for his Crime.

THE PRESIDENT IS HOLDING HIS OWN. BUFFALO, Sept. 13.—(Special).—The latest bulletin, dated 4.30 p. m., says the President has more than held his own since morning and his condition justifies an expectation of further improvement.

He is better than he was on Thursday at the same hour. Pulse 123; temperature 99.4.

THE CHIEF CAUSE OF THE COLLAPSE. The President's condition is due to failure of the digestive organs to perform their functions, the meal of solid food not agreeing with the patient.

THERE IS STILL A FIGHTING CHANCE. The Doctors say the President's life hangs by a thread. They have not given up hope, however, and consider he still has a fighting chance.

HEART FAILURE IS THREATENED. The trouble is with his heart which has to be stimulated with saline and other means.

MRS. MCKINLEY DOES NOT KNOW. Mrs. McKinley has not been informed of the President's critical condition.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET EXCITED. NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(Special).—The Stock Market is excited over the news about President McKinley and many sales were made.

THE LABOR PARTY UNSYMPATHETIC. WINNIPEG, Sept. 13.—(Special).—The Labor Party here voted down a resolution of sympathy with McKinley.

LATER. BUFFALO, Sept. 13.—(Special).—The President's heart-beating is almost imperceptible.

GUARDS TO PROTECT THE PRISONER. Five hundred soldiers have been ordered out to protect the assassin's prison against possible violence.

RELATIVES GATHER AT THE BEDSIDE. 9 P. M.—Mrs. McKinley, the President's brother Abner McKinley and other relatives are at the bedside. Members of the Cabinet and others are waiting in the ante room.

PHYSICIANS ABANDON ALL HOPE. The heart-beats have now become imperceptible. The physicians say the end is in sight.

FURTHER PROTECTION FOR THE PRISONER. Infantry under Porter are under arms and the police reserves are massed at headquarters to guard the assassin.

THE PRESIDENT FAST GROWING WEAKER. 9.30 p. m.—President McKinley is fast growing weaker and cannot possibly live until midnight.

THE CABINET TAKE A LAST FAREWELL. 10 p. m. The Cabinet Officers are now going in one by one to bid the dying President good-bye.

HE HARDENED ASSASSIN QUESTIONED. Czolgosz was taken to the office of the Superintendent at 9.30 p. m. and asked if he regretted the deed? He replied, "The only thing I regret is that I must suffer the penalty. It is what I expected."

THE PRESIDENT BECOMES UNCONSCIOUS. The President is now unconscious and occasionally groans as if in great pain. He is kept alive by oxygen. His case is resolutely hopeless.

LATEST. THE PRESIDENT'S LAST CONSCIOUS MOMENTS. 10.15 P. M. (Received here at midnight.) Before losing consciousness the President begged the doctors to let him die. His pulse is wholly gone and the Nation's Chief is dying.

OVERDOSE OF MORPHINE

A Thief Confesses Crime for Which Another Had Been Arrested.

A CRIMINAL CONFESSES. ST. JOHN, Sept. 13.—(Special).—Murray McCutcheon from LaKeview, Queen's Co., arrested for obtaining \$40 from Slipp & Flewelling on a forged order has confessed.

He also confessed to having secured money from Capt. Brennan on the steamer May Queen.

ANOTHER WRONGLY SUSPECTED. Capt. Brennan sometime ago identified Harry Nelson as the thief and Nelson was tried but succeeded in proving an alibi.

McCutcheon was a student in Currie's Business College and bears a strong resemblance to Nelson.

DR. MORRISON'S SUDDEN DEATH. Dr. J. H. Morrison who was suing the Street Railway Company for \$20,000, died suddenly this morning from an overdose of morphine taken to induce sleep which the worry and anxiety of the case, coupled with the pain of his injury had deprived him of.

His death ends the suit. It was in this case that yesterday's despatches mentioned an attempt to get witnesses out of the way.
