The funeral took place from the house at 10 o'clock on Saturday a large number attending. The services at the house and grave were conducted by Rev. J. St. Clair Jeans. The pall-bearers were Messrs. J. Edward Strong, W. A. Stewart, T. D. Ramsay, James Harris, George Hogg and C. R. Rogers.

—ON LECTURING TOUR.—Mr. J. A. Crozier, who has been spending a holiday amid the pleasant scenes of youth in Malpeque, Darnley, and other places, has left for California. He will stop off at Montreal, Winnipeg and Vancouver. At these points as well as at others he is dated to lecture before the Kiwanis Club, and the Real Estate Board of these cities. Mr. Crozier insured vacant and unimproved real estate against depreciation. During the war, 1914-18, he gave a series of lectures while he was attached to the British and Canadian recruiting mission. These lectures were replete with matter dealing effectively with topics that are calculated to educate the populace to form a proper concept of the complicated conditions. The territory over which he was placed as commanding officer was Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Wisconsin. He raised the sum of \$150,000 in eighteen minutes. At Prescott, Arizona he raised \$1,000 for the Knights of Columbus. One thousand newspapers endorse Lieut. Crozier as the man of the hour. He organized a Prince Edward Island Club, composed of one hundred Islanders, and among them Hon. D. Leard, Hon. Judge J. G. McDonald, Franklin K. Lane, Minister of Interior, United States, also Messrs. J. A. Messervey and Walter Mathieson. He also organized a Winnipeg service club in Los Angeles, California. He was present at the recent session of the County Court in Summerside. Judge Egan came down from the Bench and recognized Mr. Crozier. 
