in the station with a ... in it. My bed is being moved in today, and as we expect to be here for a long time I am going to make myself comfortable while it lasts. We do not at present intend to attack the Boers in our neighborhood and we learn they have no intention of troubling us.

But we keep a sharp lookout. We have seven picquets placed around the camp. The mine managers are very nice and do all they can to make it comfortable for us. They are very glad we are here and would feel very badly if we were to retire and allow the Boers to come in. This however, I do not think will happen.

We have not seen a paper for many weeks nor have I heard from you or home for over a month. We are completely shut off from the outside world and long to hear from Canada.

We have just learned that a large party of Boers somewhere in our rear seized a large convoy and burnt 2000 bags of mails which were being sent to the front for the army. I am afraid the report is too true, so that I cannot hope to hear from you for some time. We are in a rather doubtful position here as we are such a small force and so far away from assistance.
