The finest ferry boat which ever floated on the waters of Halifax harbor is the way a Halifax paper describes a ferryboat which called here on her way from Wilmington, Delaware, to Ogdensburg, N. Y. Only half of the long trip around has been completed, but it is expected that the little steamer will arrive at her destination about August 15th. The little boat, the "Miss Vandenberg," left Wilmington, Del., June 21. She made Halifax Saturday afternoon.

The tonnage of the steamer is only 197 tons gross—and she is unsuited for ocean going, so the steamer had to make port every night. Altogether she must have called at a score of American ports, ranging in importance from New York, where eight days were spent, to Mount Desert, where she cut across the Bay of Fundy to Yarmouth. The only ports of call in Nova Scotia have been Yarmouth, Liverpool and Halifax. Country Harbor will be the next stop and Canso will be the last Nova Scotian port touched. Charlottetown will be the only P. E. I. port of call. Day by day the little craft will thread her way along the coast, making one of the most unique trips on record. The greatest ports of the United States and Canada and the most insignificant anchorages are included in her itinerary. Captain E. J. Riley is in command and with him are five other men. The owners are represented by Captain J. L. Brian, who will command the steamer when she is placed on her route.
