IN MEMORIAM
ALEXANDER J. BRUCE

At San Francisco, Calif. on October 1st, at ten o'clock in the morning the mortal remains of Alexander J. Bruce for twenty-seven years a resident of Cardigan Prince Edward Island, were consigned to its eternal resting-place, in Mount Olivet, Memorial Park, San Francisco, California. The deceased, who has resided in San Francisco since 1912, was taken suddenly ill at his residence, 108 Webster Street, on Friday September 21st, last, which developed into double pneumonia. A week later he was removed to San Francisco hospital, when the case was declared as so serious that he was a hopeless one. Two days later he passed on.

He was a carpenter by trade and was born in Cardigan, P. E. I. in 1879. At the age of twenty-seven he followed the admonition of Horace Greely and "went west," locating in Regina, the capital of Saskatchewan. A year later he was followed by his father and mother, the late James Bruce and Mrs. Bruce.

In March 1914 the late Alex. McKurdy, also of Regina and formerly of Larga, N. S., Glasgow, Scotland, during his residence in Westminister Presbyterian Church, of which his father was a member, while never aspiring to the heights of fame, wherever he went he was known as a good citizen, devotedly religious and a true friend. And those who knew him best recognized in him "A good soul."

During the summer of 1922 the deceased, with his wife and family, came to California, where he continued to reside until his decease; and leaves to mourn their loss: Mrs. Fannie Bruce (widow), three children, Charlie, Arthur and Annie throughout the province of Canada. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. James Bruce, who is in her eighty-first year and between the time of his death and the funeral was stricken with an illness which prevented her attending the funeral and this writing is so seriously ill that she is not expected to recover.

Among those who attended the last rites were the former residents of P. E. I. were the following: Mrs. James McKensie and M. Bouchard and Murdoch Allan.

POLICE REPORT

To His Worship the Mayor and City Councilors, City of Charlottetown.

Your Worship and Gentlemen:—I have the honor to submit herewith the report of the City Police for the month of September 30, 1934.

Thirty-eight arrests were made within the City limits during September under the following classification of offences:

In addition to the above arrests there were two prosecutions and convictions for harboring an amenable person without giving notice to the Excise Department; four convictions under the Prohibition Act for the illegal consumption of liquor; three for being at large while under sentence of imprisonment; one for non-payment of dog tax; two for operating motor vehicle to the common danger; one for operating motor vehicle without license; one under the Sanitary By-Law. There were five prosecutions for disorderly conduct with three convictions and two dismissals. Three young men were charged with willful damage to pots and plants on Queen Square were each fined \$10.00 and costs including \$7.00 each for damage committed.

September 6th the Force collected thirty-seven samples of milk from licensed vendors delivering same to the City Analyst for Test. The amounts collected in fines and costs during September are as follows:

Tug of War

Notwithstanding the cool weather of Tuesday night the tug-of-war teams in the elimination contest for the Strong-Morris Junior Trophy gave a highly successful demonstration at the Bedeque rink before about three hundred people.

The main interest of the evening was the pull between North Bedeque vs. Upper Freetown. The North Bedeque team has as coach Robert Baker, and he was absent last night and Harry Muttart of Seven Mile Bay took his place, while the Upper Freetown team were under Coach Allison Profit. In the first pull North Bedeque won in two minutes and fifteen seconds, and then an argument arose over the weight of the North Bedeque team and the Upper Freetown protested the pull and the matter is now in the hands of the umpire for decision. In the second pull Upper Freetown pulled North Bedeque over the line in one minute and twenty five seconds, and the supporters of the Upper Freetown team, who were present in strength, gave their team a great ovation, as it was felt they now had an even break to secure the cup won by the North Bedeque team last year.

South Freetown vs. Sealestown. The first pull was a hard fought battle and was won by the Sealestown team in two minutes and forty seconds, but the second pull went to Sealestown in fifty seconds.

Lower Bedeque vs. New Annan. New Annan was short some of their best men but they gave Lower Bedeque a strenuous time. Lower Bedeque has as coach Mr. Willie Jenkins, while New Annan is under the leadership of Mr. Arthur Wright. The rivalry is keen. Lower Bedeque won both pulls, the first in two minutes and ten seconds and the second in one minute and fifteen seconds. The time of one of these tug-of-war pulls may seem short to those who have never seen a contest of this kind, but with ten strong men engaged in throwing every ounce of their strength and energy against ten men of equal weight and strength on the other end of the rope and the starting line, it is an endurance test that cannot hold out for any great length of time.

The referee was George Ehem of Summerside, who very capably handles these pulls to the satisfaction of the teams.

Will Approve Of Royal Marriage

LONDON, Oct. 8.—One of Canada's foremost scholars, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett may be called on to "approve" the forthcoming marriage between Prince George and Princess Marina. But its all a formality.

Coincidentally three overseas members of the Royal Canadian Council are in London at the same time—Premier Bennett, Deputy Prime Minister General Jan Smuts of South Africa and Stanley Bruce, Australian High Commissioner. They are expected to attend the Privy Council the King will hold tomorrow to formally approve of the Royal marriage.

General Smuts has just arrived by air from South Africa, primarily to be installed as Lord Rector of St. Andrew's University on Oct. 16. But his office expires only a few weeks later and General Smuts' inability to make the journey for installation when he was elected some months ago.
