

# Anti Aircraft Wins Free For All At Montague

## All Four Classes Provide Big Crowd With Close Finishes

Coming from far back with tremendous bursts of speed in the first two heats to head the field under the wire and pacing the last half of the second mile in 1:02 4-5, Anti-Aircraft, driven by Willard Kelly captured the free for all event at Montague yesterday afternoon with as driving a show of pacing power as has ever been seen on the Island circuit. The winner was beaten by a nose by Kavola in the third heat as for the second time in the race the photo finish camera had to be consulted to decide the winner.

But while Anti-Aircraft's upset victory stole the spotlight after the poor showing the Horton-owned pacer had made at Summerside last week young Joe Hennessey drove Miss Knox to a stunning upset victory in the 2.24 pace when after finishing ninth in the first two heats as Romeo and June Morning were dividing matters he raced home in front in the third heat and then paced off with the extra heat to complete his victory.

The highest payoff ever made on the pari-mutuels occurred in the third heat when Miss Knox paid \$547.50 for a \$2.00 ticket only one bet being wagered on her chances.

Eva Worthy was looking for trotters in chalking up a straight heat victory in the 2.22 trot while Talugi, owned by the St. Croix stable, stepped in as was expected in capturing the Victoria Driving Club's 2.28 stake.

It was a great afternoon's racing with stretch duels being the order of the day and the bumper crowd that packed the stand and flowed over into the infield being held in a high state of excitement as the horses battled it out right to the wire in the driving, sensational finishes.

**2:22 TROT**

Eva Worthy, trotting faultlessly in all three heats had a little too much speed for the other four trotters pitted against her. She came from behind in the first heat to beat out Billy Kalmuck in a close finish trotting away in the last few strides to win by half a length.

Going away at the rail for the middle mile Eva staved off the challenge of George Mac in the early stages then she made every post a winning one with Billy Kalmuck in the closing stages again to win by a length with Buddy Moko coming fast in the stretch to cop third. George Mac fourth and Nell Kalmuck fifth.

Getting away on top for the third heat Eva again made every post a winning one with Billy Kalmuck again second, George Mac moving up a notch to third being beaten by the Kalmuck horse. Nell Kalmuck was fourth and Buddy Moko fifth, the exact order in which they trotted by the stands the first trip around.

**VICTORIA DRIVING CLUB STAKE**

Fourteen horses came to the wire for the feature event of the meeting and although Talugi proved to have too much pace for the others driver Earl Semple had to take him all out in chalking up the victory. Sent away on the first score for the first heat, Talugi paced around the leaders to go to the front at the second turn. She still had the lead as they came by the stands and hit into the backstretch the second time but Talugi started to move up from there with Ann Clegg doing likewise and the battle to the line was between the pair of them with Talugi having a two length margin at the wire.

It was all Talugi during the second mile. Ann Clegg tested him to the quarter pole before having to take back and from there home Talugi was never in any great danger as the race developed into a battle between the winner and the runner-up but again the Clegg mare couldn't make the grade.

It was much the same story in the final heat, Talugi went away winning and never headed while Ann Clegg and Buddy Bud-

long staged a tight duel for second spot with the Clegg mare again finishing in second place.

**FREE FOR ALL**

Taking the lead right from the word Kavola raced to the front of the field of five pacers to lead them up the backstretch. True Hal seeking to take over paced on the outside right past the stands but was forced to take back. As they went down the backstretch the second trip Kavola, Royal At Law, Alycane and Anti Aircraft went to simultaneous drives. At the three quarter pole Anti Aircraft had moved up from fifth to third. At the top of the stretch he was in second place to Kavola who had taken over the lead and in the sensational stretch drive the Aircraft managed to get his head in front as they paced under the wire.

Scoring by Kavola for the second heat after the Aircraft had failed to get his field down Kavola led the field away only to lose the rail to True Hal at the first turn; at the half Anti Aircraft had moved up on the outside of True Hal to take over at the first turn and from there on was never headed as the Law mare hammered away at each other hammer and tongs in the extra heat but again Miss Knox outpaced them. Taking the lead on the backstretch the second time around driver Hennessey opened up a two length lead and flashed under the wire with that much to spare with Romeo moving past June Morning in the stretch to capture the runner-up position.

Three horses, Quick Lick, Tiny Budlong and Maudine Budlong figured in a dangerous looking nipup in the first heat of the Stake Race as all three went down in a tangle of sukies halfway up the backstretch but luckily both drivers and horses escaped free from serious injury although Maudine Budlong's bike was smashed to pieces in the mishap.

**2:24 PACE**

Just Flicka, Harold Gudmore's little pace took the field of nine horses away on the third score for the first heat. June Morning made an early bid for the lead but was forced to tuck in, came on again in the stretch to get up on even terms at the half and finally took over at the turn. Roy Shelburne starting for Anti Aircraft fast made it a thrilling three horse battle as June and Flicka continued their stirring battle. At the top of the stretch a blanket could have covered all three with June second and Shelburne third and the remainder closely bunched a couple of strides back. Sent away fast in the second heat Roy Shelburne had a three length lead on the field as they hit into the backstretch the first trip around but Romeo pacing very fast overtook him at the upper turn to go to the front. At the half it was Romeo, Roy Shelburne,

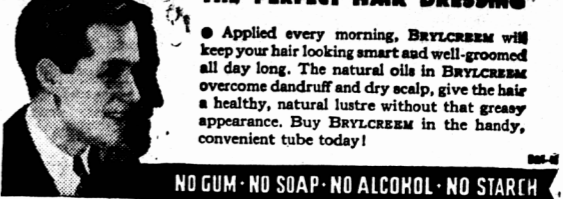

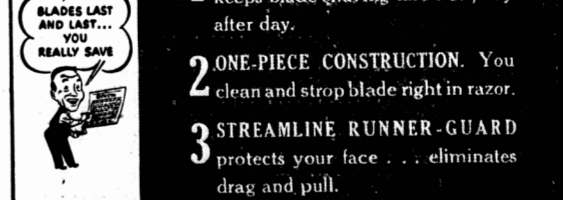

Value of the photo finish machine used at Montague yesterday for the first time in Island track history was evident in picking the winners in more than one instance. While the first heat of the free-for-all was close the third was even closer and the machine operated by W. E. Codrey assisted by Clow and Smith caught the horses with their noses right at the wire.

The pictures were pretty nearly letter perfect and there could be no doubt left in the most rabid fans' mind once he had glimpsed the camera's story on printing paper.

Now that the camera has passed its first test its use should become universal all over the Island circuit and likely throughout the Maritimes and its presence at meetings will certainly do away with a lot of the arguments that usually result when a close finish is witnessed.
