Blackhawks Halt Ranger's Winning Streak At Eight; Leafs And Amerks Win

NEW YORK, Dec. 26 — Chicago Blackhawks put the brakes on New York Rangers' winning streak tonight by trimming the Manhattan team 3-1. It was Rangers' loss in eight National Hockey League games.

A major penalty given to Lynn Patrick in the second period proved the turning point in the game. The Blackhawks scoring their first two goals while the big winger was in the cooler.

About a minute after Patrick was ejected, Jimmy Gotsis fired a shot past Davey Kerr. Before Patrick returned Cully Dahlstrom added another goal with Gotsis and Glen Brydson gaining assists.

The Ranger scored early in the third period via Butch Keeling. But before the lone Ranger goal, Louis Trudel and Seibert broke from a power play, Seibert scoring.

Binns Kayos McCormac While Jimmy McInnis Wins From Lantz In Eight

Starting a comeback campaign that he hopes will lead him back to his Island middleweight title, Bennie Binns Friday night knocked out Danny McCormac of Souris after 2 minutes and 50 seconds of fighting in the main event of the Christmas Day boxing card staged at the Labor Union Hall. Two hard left hand wallops to the body followed by a right cross to the jaw spelled defeat for the former lightweight champion after McCormac had surprised all the fans present with his stand before the dynamite laden fists of Binns.

On the defensive nearly every minute of the scrap McCormac made Binns come to him in every round. For six of them he managed to keep away but in the seventh Binns finally caught up with him. At this stage both fighters presented a bloody sight. Each was bleeding from a nose over the left eye while Binns' nose was also dripping claret from McCormac's stiff counter punches. But tired as he was Binns still had that potent wallop left in the seventh.

Binns circling his opponent continually saw McCormac elude every swing he made. Bennie was wild with his punches until the last round of the scrap. Then suddenly he started throwing his punches straight. Two left hand wallops to the body weakened the Souris boy and as Binns landed with a right flush to the eye McCormac dropped to the canvas for the full count.

Fight Cautiously

Throughout the opening round both boys were content to feel each other out. Binns was far cooler than he appeared in other fights and early in the session he opened a nasty cut over his opponent's eye but it was the only damaging punch landed during the rounds. Throughout the second third and fourth the winner again kept boring in but McCormac was content to counter punch landing with stiff blows at various times.

The action suddenly stepped up as the fifth opened, Binns again starting to force was met with a two-fisted attack by McCormac. As they battled it out McCormac cut Binns' left eye badly with a hard right hand but although Bennie appeared groggy at this stage he lasted it out until the bell.

McCormac hit Binns with the fifth by a wide margin but it was a different story in the sixth. Binns came out as fresh as ever. Although bleeding badly at the nose he began the round by swinging punches at every angle but although the majority of his blows were wild he did catch his opponent with a few that had McCormac in difficulties. Both were tired as they went to their corners.

Getting away from his wild-swinging tactics Binns has marked his work all through the previous six sessions Binns suddenly started to shoot his punches in straight starting the seventh, and it marked the beginning of the end of the scrap. After a minute and a half of fighting Bennie landed two left hand jabs to the body and as he crossed with a whistling right to the jaw McCormac went down for the full count.

Daughter Held In Mother's Death

McInnis Beats Lantz In The Eighth

Billed only as the semi-final fight between "Irish" Jimmy McInnis and Russell "Kid" Lantz of Halifax, the present holder of the Maritime heavyweight championship proved to be one of the best and at the same time most grueling battles ever held in the city, a scrap that wound up with McInnis being awarded a technical knockout victory over the Halifax battler as Lantz seconds three in the towel after the completion of the seventh round.

But although the fight ended suddenly and with Lantz protesting strongly against his seconds action the fans present saw a magnificent battle between two boys that asked or gave no quarter.

McInnis boxing beautifully all through the piece continually appeared Lantz with right and left hand wallops from the second round on. But Lantz, the greatest fighter that has ever displayed his wares in an Island ring refused to go to the floor and kept on slinging punches
