Annual Statement Provincial Bank

The annual statement of the Provincial Bank of Canada for the year ended November 30, 1949, shows profits at \$718,711.12, compared with \$683,733.40 at the close of the preceding year. Net profits are \$389,684.98 against \$324,199.38 last year and amount to 0.97 per share, compared with 0.81 a year ago, an increase of 0.16. Quarterly dividends of 6% per annum and a special dividend of 1% per annum were paid to the shareholders, representing a total of \$280,000. The balance of profits carried forward at \$109,684.98 compared with \$44,199.38 a year ago and the balance of credit of the profit and loss account stands now at \$502,020.66.

Shrinking Profits Has President Of C.N.R. Worried

MONTREAL, Dec. 26 —(CP)— Gross revenues of Canadian National Railways for 1949 will establish a record high but the shrinking margin between revenues and expenses "continues to cause considerable anxiety," R. C. Vaughan, chairman and president, said in a year-end statement today. He estimated gross revenues at \$499,000,000, an increase of \$8,000,000 over 1948. Operating expenses were estimated at \$480,000,000, an increase of \$15,000,000. "The operating surplus of approximately \$19,000,000 will be the lowest since 1938," he said, "and after provision for interest due on securities held by the public and owing to the Government, payment of taxes, equipment, rents and similar charges the year will end with an income deficit estimated at \$4,000,000."

Poultrymen In B. C. Pressing For Gov't Action

VANCOUVER, Dec. 22 —(CP)— Biddy the hen is in the news today with a price crisis in the egg market. In British Columbia a \$20,000,000 industry is threatened, and producers say there must be a Government subsidy or a new large market to solve the problem. A subsidy would be only a temporary cushion, but a new market—possibly greater domestic demand—might bring a permanent solution. Unless producers get early aid, spokesmen for the industry say, many will go bankrupt. "Our industry must have a floor price if we are to exist," said H. Bolivar of New Westminster, a member of the B. C. Poultry Industrial Council.

Special Training For Yank Troops in Berlin

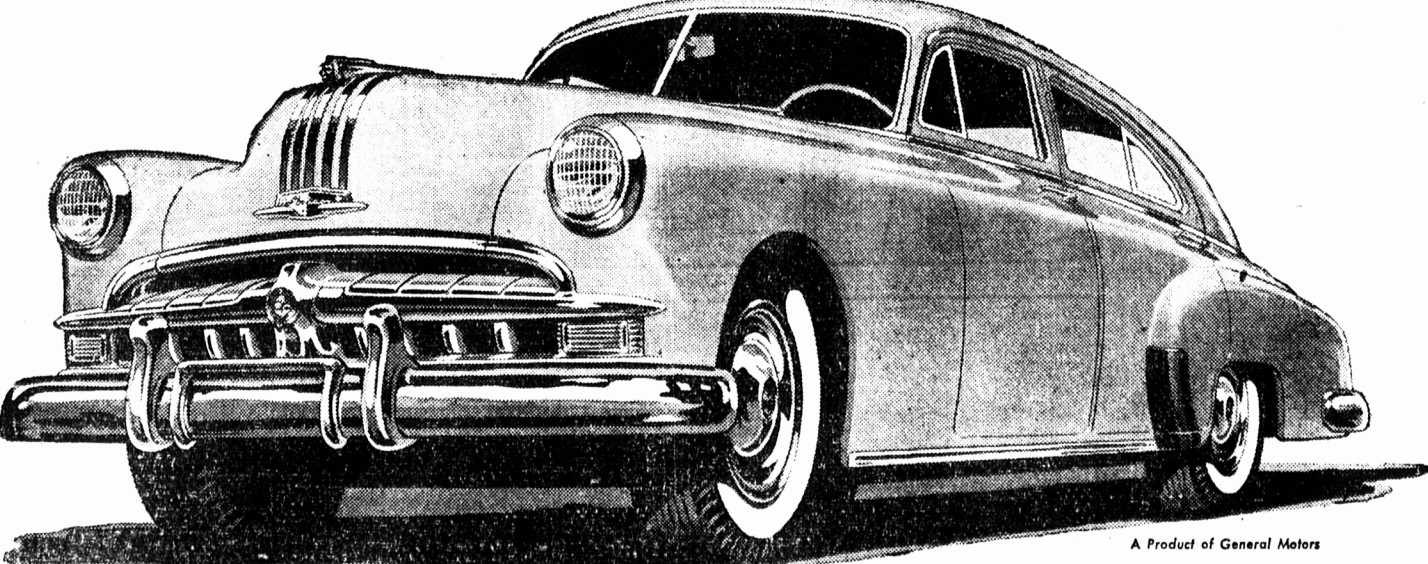
BERLIN, Dec. 22 — (AP) — The United States army has ordered riot control training for all American troops in Berlin, at the same time making it clear that no emergency is expected.

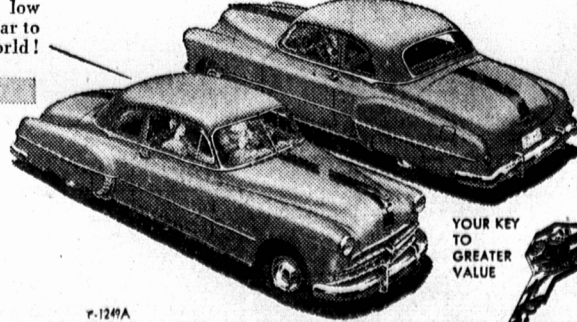
