LONDON, March 9--A verdict of death from natural causes was recorded at an inquest in Camberwell in the case of Dr. John Rohan Cameron, 54, a Canadian. 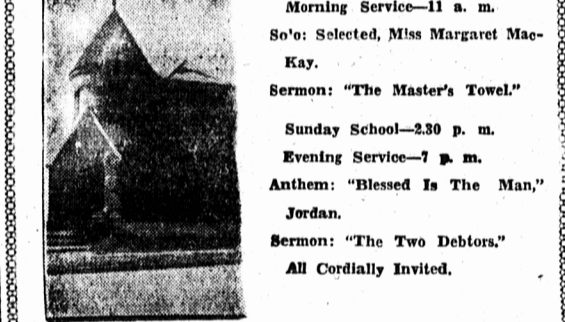

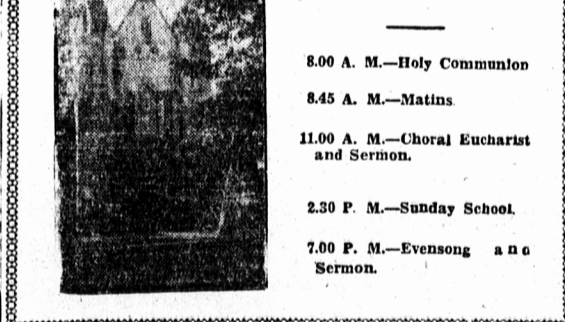

Demand Resignation Of Ontario Liquor Control Board

TORONTO, March 11-(CP)-Resignation of members of the Ontario Liquor Control Board was demanded by delegates today in a resolution passed by the Ontario Temperance Federation, which heard a speaker predict a cleavage between senior and junior members of Premier Hepburn's cabinet. Rev. George Little, led the split in his address at the final session of the Federation's annual convention. He based his statement on his belief that senior cabinet members are anxious for continuance of the large liquor revenue. Dr. Little also charged Ontario's Premier with having gone out of his way to act as spokesman "for the other side."
Of the \$9,000,000 realized by the government in the past 44 months from liquor, said Dr. Little, millions of it had been spent in erecting mental institutions which are flooded with applications due to alcoholism.
"The resolution asking resignation of the Liquor Control Board charged that the board had promoted rather than controlled liquor sales during the last three years."

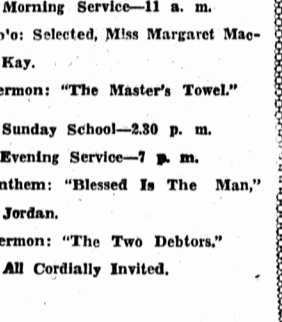

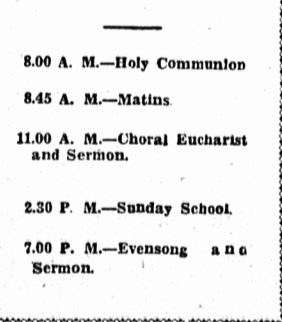

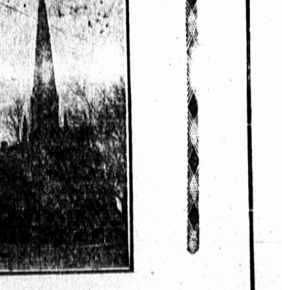
