I. but resided in Pictou for a number of years where her many friends will regret to hear of her death. Some time ago Mrs. Graham met with an accident the development of which led to her demise after many months of sufferings.—Pictou Advocate.

THERE was a fine display of cattle, twenty-two in all, of pure shorthorn and shorthorn grades on the Market Square yesterday. Wallace Toombs, of North Rustico, had four steers and one heifer, weighing altogether 5,550 lbs. one was a two year old, the others three. His brother Hammond Toombs, of North Rustico, had five steers and one heifer, total weight 7,505 lbs, all except one were three year olds. J. F. McNeill, of Cavendish, had one steer weighing 1,270 lbs. James Laird, of Cavendish, had one steer weighing 1,115 lbs. Nelson Orr, of New Glasgow, had two steers, (one weighing 1,250) and two heifers, weighing in all 4,540 lbs. Daniel Bulman of Rustico had 3 steers weighing 2,935 lbs., and William A. Houston of Rustico, 2 cows weighing respectively 1,130 and 1,185 lbs. The total weight of the herd was 25,230. The price paid by Mr. Blake was 54 cts., or a total of \$1,324.58 for the herd.
