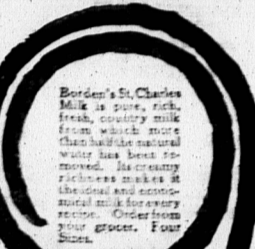

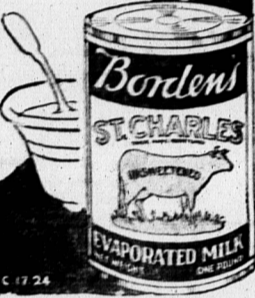

The Pastor of the Church, Rev. M. J. MacPherson, M.A., B.D., was present to carry out his duties of chairman in his usual capable manner...

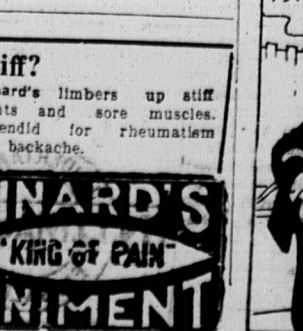

British Action Assures Success German Loan

BERLIN, Oct. 3.—The German loan of £200,000,000 now is practically assured. During the last few weeks Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, has sounded out the smaller countries and has found the financiers of Switzerland, Holland and Italy were unwilling to commit themselves until Great Britain spoke. Now it seems that the British have practically consented to take their share.

The loan will yield the investor approximately eight per cent, and probably will be of about 25 years duration.

The United States will take \$100,000,000, the British \$50,000,000 and the remaining \$50,000,000 will be distributed in small parts among Holland, Switzerland, Italy, France, and Germany.

American bankers have strongly urged marketing of a small portion among the German people as a sign of good faith. It is almost certain that this will be done.

It is expected here that the result of the loan will not only be to provide Germany with money to set up the new bank, etc., but that it will also loosen a stream of foreign credit to German industries.

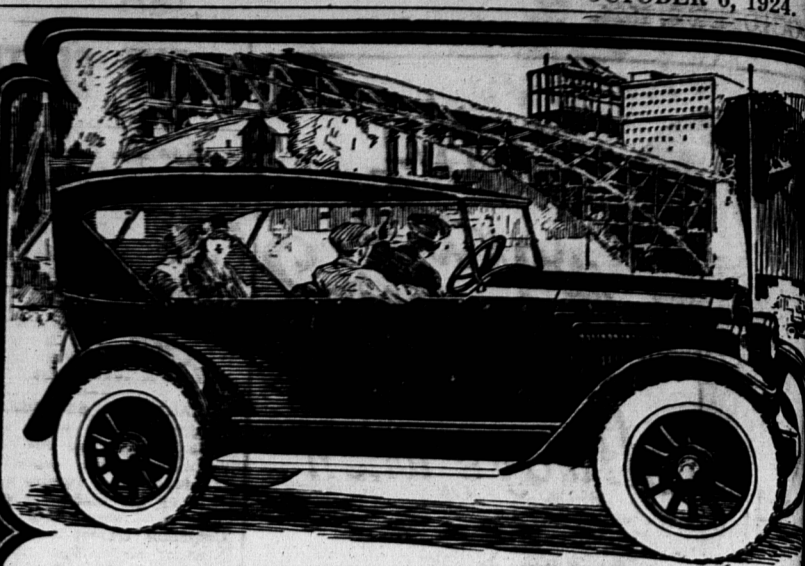

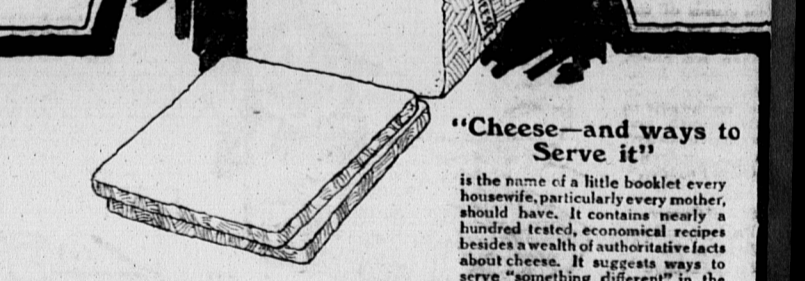

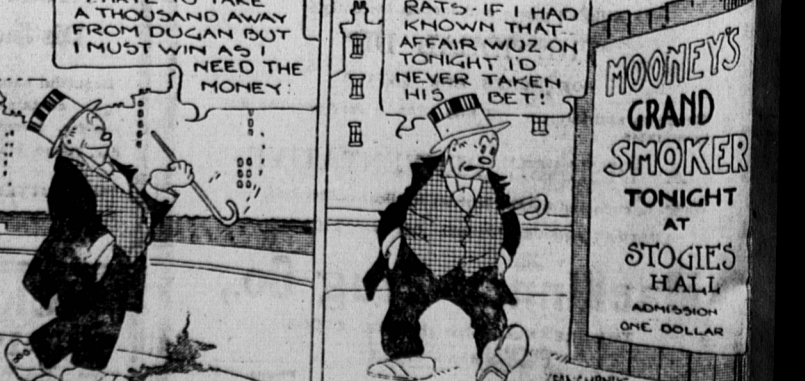
