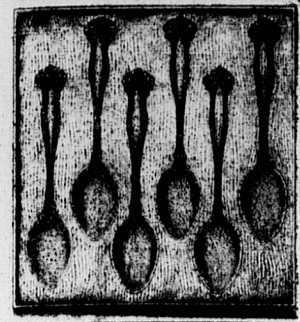

Value 100 lbs. milk to patrons \$1.70.
