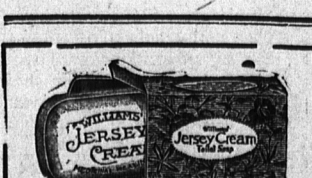

CALLS FOR DECLARATION.

The "hyphenated" citizen in Canada or the United States was likened to Joah in decent times a smote Amantya of the fifty ribs, by Rev. A. Morrison D.D., Ph.D., last evening at his West side church. After describing the German-Austrian intrigue in the States, Dr. Morrison went on: "This war will end in time, and in time the world's wasted wealth will be replaced and the ranks of the dead moloch of war will be filled. This world will recover from these shocking losses, but how long I think you will it take the world to recover its former confidence and trust in the German nation. Can we ever again trust the Germans? This is a most distressing question, but it is one that has to be faced, for no nation can consider herself any longer safe which fails to keep a sharp eye upon the German in Germany and also upon the German who has taken up his abode elsewhere in the world. There is no use ignoring or denying the fact that these Germans have completely repudiated the moral standards by which all so-called Christian nations have been recognized as acknowledged. With them, lies have taken the place of truth; while perjury and murder have become their most exquisite weapons with which to deceive or destroy those who happened to obstruct the road that led to their world ambition. They are truly a peculiar people and many of them who have come to this Western continent seeking a share of its wealth have never become assimilated. The English, the Scotch, the Irish the Dane and Norwegian, the Swede the Slav and indeed all races of white men have become assimilated by the lands of their adoption, but not so numbers of those of Teutonic descent and blood.

"In the year 1910 out of a total population of almost 92,000,000 of people in the United States, there were no less than 2,500,000 born in Germany, and 1,175,000 born in Austria. Of these in the same year 88,900 native born Germans and 186,000 native born Austrians had taken out naturalization papers and hence were legally qualified to vote. The influence of the Embros is being felt upon the government politics is acknowledged. In Canada also the last few years has witnessed a large immigration of this same Teutonic stock. The Census of 1911 indicated that there were 39,577 German-born people in Canada and 121,430 of Austro-Hungarian birth. Canada has opened wide her doors to these people and has accorded them a most heart welcome. Seeking our shores as a race physically clean, with also high class mental potentiality or attainment they have demonstrated by their ability and industry that they were such stuff as well might be gladly

welcomed in any country in which a great state was in process of creation. Thus far we have heard but few complaints levelled against these people. Probably many of them realize much more definitely than it is possible for us to realize how infinitely happier are the conditions of individual and national life here than they are in the land from which they have come. "For myself, far be it from me to refuse these people all neighborly kindness and Christian charity. On the other hand I have felt that at this time of world agony, when the whole earth more or less, is enduring the birth pangs of a new civilization, when great moral issues are being fiercely contested, and the very rights of man denied, I say that I have felt that now is the time for the leader whether among the native born Canadians to keep silent as to the moral and political principles involved. "Surely the great statesmen of our land, men of both political parties, have nobly responded to this patriotic duty. The clergy also of all the churches have spoken with no uncertain sound, while the representative business men have by their most liberal contributions to the various funds, left no uncertainty as to where their hearts were enlisted. Throughout our land there are here and there to be found prominent German-born Canadians, men who bulk large in the affairs of our growing country. These men enjoy our goodwill and confidence. Would I not, may I venture to ask, be a gracious act, should these men come out publicly and denounce the atrocities and flagrant violations of international law that have been observed in the conduct of the war by the Prussian war lords. There are no reasons in Canada why German-born Canadians should not exercise the fullest liberty of both voice and pen.
