THE NEW KING'S COLLEGE. On Thursday next at 12 o'clock noon, the corner stone of the new building of King's College, Windsor, N. S., will be laid by the Honorable the Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia. The Maritime Provinces should be interested in this event as King's College is the oldest Overseas University residence, the corner stone of which was laid by Bishop Inglis in 1791. A great effort is to be made in the near future to put King's College, (the officially recognized college for the Anglican Dioceses of Fredericton and Nova Scotia) on a sound footing. The matter of the College will be one of the most important items of business to be considered at the Diocesan Synod at Halifax next week. It is planned to have a general canvass for the forward movement of the college in Prince Edward Island during the early part of June.

NEW USE FOR POTATO DIGGER.—The residents of that section of country in the vicinity of the Covehead Road are being treated to something original and unique in the way of road making demonstration. The apparatus utilized for this purpose is nothing more or less than a potato digging machine, and it is causing great amusement among all who have occasion to travel over the Covehead Road. It is not known who is the originator of this wonderful device to improve the art of road-making but there is a general suspicion that the blame lies either with the Commissioner of Public Works, the Supervisor or the Roadmaster. At any rate the strange looking innovation on the roads is not calculated to bring imperishable renown of a desirable nature to whoever it may be as the work which it does is said to be utterly useless. Relics of Nine Successive Civilizations Are Expected to be Unearthed

ATTACKED BY CRUSADERS

Treat In Store For Music Lovers

On Thursday evening next in the Prince Edward Theatre, the Charlottetown Choral Society will present Gaul's "Holy City"—a famousatorio. Those who attended the first concert given by this society in February last have memories of a most delightful night devoted to the musical art, and it is safe to predict an event of even greater success on Thursday next. The Society will number about 100 voices assisted by an orchestra of 10 pieces. The chorus is exceedingly well balanced and excellent choral work will be heard. The solo work in the Holy City will be given by an excellent quartette of Halifax singers, namely, Miss Donovan, Soprano, of All Saints Cathedral; Mrs. Wilson, Contralto, of St. Paul's; Mr. Trayton Drake, tenor and Mr. Haddock, bass. The excellence of the whole rendition will be greatly enhanced by the presence of these visiting artists. Mr. Drake is said to be a most sensational young tenor, who has created great enthusiasm wherever he has appeared.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—Relics of seven or more cities which successively stood on the same site, and of nine different civilizations, are expected to be uncovered by the excavation of the Biblical city Bethshan, in Palestine, which is to be undertaken in June. The work will be done under the direction of Clarence S. Fisher, curator of the Egyptian section of the Museum of the University of Pennsylvania. Official permission to undertake this work has been received from the Government of Palestine.

Beth-shan is now known as Beisan. It is situated in the valley of Jezreel, just west of the Jordan and not far south of the Sea of Galilee. More great battles are believed to have taken place within sight of this city than, perhaps, on any other spot known to history. The investigators hope to find there the keys to the whole history of that section of the world written either on marble slabs containing the laws, decrees, treaties and other information or on bronze tablets or written in clay with cone-form characters.

Beth-shan was a strategic point of value to any of the great military leaders of ancient times who aspired to try his hand at world domination. It was on the route of all the builders of ancient empires.

Beginning 5,000 years ago, it suffered the blows of the armies of Sargon, Abraham, Hammurabi, Sennacherib, Nebuchadnezzar, Thothmes, Saul, David, Alexander, Pompey and Napoleon. Joshua led his troops against Beth-shan, but could not take it because its defenders used iron chariots—fore-runners of the tanks of the world war.

The Crusaders made Beth-shan a point of attack in their vain efforts to conquer Damascus. When the Assyrians came down like a wolf on the fold, Beth-shan was one of the places they took and it has been dominated in turn by the Greeks, Romans and Arabs.

The investigators expect to find there the strata of perhaps more than seven cities, each built upon the ruins of the other as successive waves of invasion swept over and destroyed it. It is within sight of the Mount of Transfiguration, the scene of battle between David and Saul, and the Witch of Endor, who recalled the shade of the Prophet Samuel to enlighten Saul, had her home near this ancient city whose secrets now are sought.

CHARLES EASTER

Many will learn with deep regret of the death of Charles Easter of Charlottetown on April 20th 1921, from congestion of the brain. Mr. Easter was born at North Wiltshire in 1847, his life's work was spent in farming, he also gave very efficient service as postmaster having held this position for forty years.

Two years ago on account of failing health, he sold his farm and with his wife and daughters moved to Charlottetown. He bought the Savoy house now known as the Easter Hotel. Mr. Easter was kind and courteous to all who knew him it can be truly said he went away not having an enemy. Those left to mourn are his sorrowful wife, one son Edgar of Hampshire, two daughters Mary, (Mrs Chandler), and Amy of Charlottetown, a grand daughter, Emma Chandler, Charlottetown, also one brother John of St. Vincent, Minn., one sister Mrs. Archibald Easter, O'Leary.

His remains were taken to North Wiltshire cemetery for burial. The funeral service at the house and grave, (which was very impressive) was conducted by his pastor Rev. Mr. Glendenning. The pall bearers were Wm. Bowman, J. R. Edwards, Isaac Smith, Richard Mitchell, Wm. Clark, Wm. Mitchell.

DECISION RESERVED IN THE ROSS CASE

Hearing of Evidence in Preliminary Examination of Mansfield Ross, Charged With Being An Accessory After Fact of Perry Murder Conducted at Yarmouth

YARMOUTH, N. S., May 8.—Mansfield Ross charged with being an accessory after the fact, in the murder of Captain George Henry Perry here on Wednesday last, was remanded until Wednesday afternoon next by Stipendiary Charles S. Pelton, following the conclusion of the preliminary examination into his case. The only witness heard this morning was Leonard Elliot, the first police officer to arrive at the scene of the murder on the night of the tragedy. He described the condition in which he found the Perry home and said that Ross had told him apparently been robbed as the Captain's watch and purse were missing. The witness said he had observed that the watch would prove a good clue to the murderer and the accused had agreed with him in this.

LAUDS DANTE AS A CATHOLIC

Pope's Encyclical Recalls the Poet's Fidelity to the Church

ROME, May 8.—On the occasion of the sixth centenary of the death of Dante Pope Benedict has addressed an encyclical to all students of Catholic universities and institutes, recalling the poet's fidelity to the Catholic religion.

The Pontiff quotes many passages from Dante as confirming the Catholic doctrine and as showing how profound was Dante's respect for the teachings of the church and the authority of the Roman Pontificate.

Pope Benedict explains passages from the works of the poet in which Dante reproaches the Popes or ecclesiastical dignitaries by observing that this was due partly to circumstances, partly to vicissitudes in the poet's life or to false information received by him. In concluding, the encyclical proclaims Dante as the "greatest singer of the Christian truth" and invites all scholars to study his works in the same Christian spirit as they were written.
