A London Firm Instructs Us.

We have been instructed by a Fur firm in London, England, to dispose of forty-eight pieces of Orenberger-Mink and Squirrel furs, comprising ruffs, muffs and scarfs, in the latest designs—many of them only one sett of its kind. They were sent to the Island by mistake.

The firm they were shipped to, would not take delivery as they were not as ordered. They were held in the Customs bonded warehouse for the last three months, to the shippers order.

We received orders to pay the duty and sell them for what they would bring, as re-shipping back to London would cost too much.

We will not stock the furs, but will dispose of them at a price that will make them scamper. If you are interested in Fur buying this fall, the prices will be as low, if not lower, than furs are offered at during January after stock is depleted and fur season over.
